B. C. AWAKENS

Under the caption "The Awakening of British Columbia," the Toronto Globe has the following to say in regard to the result of the recent election in this province:

The great Pacific coast province of British Columbia two days ago awoke from its political lethargy and started on a new career on a higher ethical plane. The McBride-Bowser government, which had administered its affairs for the past thirteen years with the most cynical disregard for political decency, went to its doom and was practically obliterated. It had been sowing the wind for years, and, as usual, it reaped the whirlwind. It has been extinguished as completely as the Roblin government was disposed of in Manitoba, and its members may consider themselves lucky if they escape such an aftermath as followed its overthrow. The movement that visited retribution so effectually on persistent and flagrant wrongdoers was a popular one, and it included discontented Conservatives as well as indignant Liberals: prominent among the former was Sir Herbert Tupper, who contributed greatly to the satisfactory result of the election.

The Liberal leader, Mr. H. C. Brewster, will have a safe working majority, no matter how the soldiers may have voted, and he will have plenty of good material out of which to form his cabinet. He has been much more of a business man than a professional politician, and that is at present a fortunate thing for a province that has been brought by professional politicians to the very verge of insolvency through scandalously unbusinesslike administration of its resources. He knows the province thoroughly, and is peculiarly adapted in other ways for the responsible task to which

he has been called by his fellow-citizens.

The greatest need of British Columbia today is such an increase of population as will develop its extremely valuable natural resources, and transform it from a food-importing into a food-exporting province. Much of its Crown domain has been alienated to speculators who are making no industrial use of land they have been allowed to acquire on a margin. This must be radically changed either by crediting them with the payments they have made and giving them title to as much land as they represent, or in some other way equally effective. What is needed is a numerous population attached to the soil, not a few landholders acting as vampires sucking the life-blood of the community. The Victoria Times and Vancouver Sun have done much to expose the iniquities of British Columbia's land laws and prepare the way for reform.

The prohibition victory in the referendum vote is of a piece with the great political revolution with which it is contemporaneous. It brings British Columbia into the great thrift procession which the war has done much to originate and will yet do more to maintain. The prohibitionist campaign was contributed to by many agencies, among which it will not be invidious to specify The Vancouver World newspaper. By their success they have brought British Columbia into line with the other western provinces, with Ontario, and, for all practical purposes, with the Maritime Provinces.

canning himself—canned everything that was useful, smiles, gestures, kind words, witty sallies, set orations, bons mots, impromptu epigrams—Canned it all—wasted nothing. Sam is some preserver—his preserves keep. Sam will not only be served up in canned form at the next general election, but the chances are that he will be provided with a shelf in the Victoria Museum and thus provide nourishment for ages to come. Fancy our descendants a hundred years from now smacking their lips over Sam, the vintage of 1916!

If the Eye Witnesses get night sweats keeping up with Sam while he is asleep, what must their efforts be when he is awake and on the jump? Perhaps you will get a better idea if I describe A Day in London With Sir Sam. Having partaken of simple soldier's breakfast, consisting of grapefruit, kidney and bacon, poached eggs, griddle cakes, toast and coffee—all of which are tunelessly recorded on the phonograph, and graphically on the films—Sir Sam sets out with his Eye Witnesses, the picture machine and

Between the Monument on the East and the Marble Arch on the West he takes the salute from one hundred and fifty of his honorary colonels, passes the time of day with them, learns their names, some of them for the first time, and collects other valuable information. Somewhere near Trafalgar Square he falls in with Premier Hearst, who has been interned by the Allies until the trouble in South West Toronto blows over. They condole.

From there Sir Sam proceeds to the War Office, which he stimulates by his lively remarks on its old fashioned way of stringing out a war which he would have won long ago. Having scattered these seeds of kindness, Sir Sam makes his way to the United Service Club, where he tells them that there is only one man left, now that Kitchener is dead, and that his name begins with an H. He repeats the tale at the Carlton, and the Guards, and thus increases his popularity with the British aristocracy. Along about three in the afternoon he saunters over to Buckingham Palace, and wises King George up for a couple of hours, after which he takes tea with Queen Mary and greatly brightens that august lady by his frank criticism of her German relations. 
