ENEMY PRACTICALLY EXHAUSTED IN WEST

NEW GERMAN SUPER-SUBMARINE -- RUSSIANS TAKE FIFTEEN HUNDRED MORE

GERMAN LINES FORCED BACK ON WESTERN FRONT

Important Gains by Allies—Germans practically Exhausted—Gen. Alderson Transfers to Imperial Forces.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 29.—Following the capture of Morval by the British, the enemy evacuated his positions to the northeast during the night. The result of the Allied victory at Comblès is that the German lines have now been forced back into an arc six miles deep, containing forty-four villages and covering a territory of a hundred and seventeen square miles.

The British and French are forcing the pace while the Germans are practically exhausted. General Sir Douglas Haig's forces are attacking from the north and the French from the south.

General Alderson Transferred.
General Alderson, who commanded the Canadian Expeditionary Force up to the second battle of Ypres, is now being transferred to the Imperial Forces.

MR. SHAW INTERVIEWED RE ALBERTA ELECTION

"As it is only a few days since Premier Sifton returned from Europe, the rumor-makers seem to have been rather enterprising," said R. L. Shaw, member for Stettler, in the Alberta Legislature, when shown the report this morning that there was to be an immediate election in his province.

"Personally, I cannot say with any certainty what basis there is for the story as I have been in B. C. for some time and have not had an opportunity of talking with Premier Sifton since his return. Nevertheless, there is ample justification for an early election in our province. The government, in the past three sessions, has undertaken some sweeping reforms including woman suffrage, prohibition, legislation for farmers' elevators, co-operative farms, trading laws and other measures along those lines. These things are radical departures from what any legislature attempted before the war and the principles of representative government demand that the government which undertakes such departures should have no hesitation about submitting its action to the electorate for ratification."

Mr. Shaw is in Prince Rupert for only a few days, en route for Vancouver where he has manufacturing interests.

THIRD GERMAN MERCHANT SUB. NEARLY READY

Kaiser will be Ready to Sail in a Month—Larger Vessel Than Deutschland—Two Ships Sunk.

London, Sept. 29.—It is reported that the third German merchant submarine will be ready to sail for the United States within a month. The new super-submarine is to be christened the Kaiser and is slightly larger than the Deutschland, which appears to have made the return voyage successfully.

The Bremen.
Dr. T. T. McKenzie of the University of Pennsylvania, reported the other day, on his arrival at Philadelphia, that the super-submarine Bremen was captured by the British navy and is now safely in Falmouth harbor. The Admiralty is silent on the subject, but it is freely discussed in semi-official circles. It is said that the Bremen had \$25,000,000 worth of valuable aniline dyes and precious stones on board.

Ships Sunk.
London, Sept. 29.—The Swedish steamer Stathe and the British vessel Benguela have been sunk.

INTERNED CRUISERS

WAR CREDIT

FURTHER TALK OF STEAMSHIP MERGER

For the past few weeks there have been rumors of a merger of the Alaska Steamship Company interests with those of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company. The rumors were denied by both companies but there is reason to believe that some such arrangement has been practically completed and that Mr. Alexander, president of the Alaska S. S. Company will be the head of the combination. The change may affect Prince Rupert as the controlling interest seems to be in the hands of the Alaska Company which has never reckoned that business warranted their vessels calling at this port. On the other hand, there has recently been a large increase in the traffic between Prince Rupert and Alaska and the change may mean an increased number of American vessels calling here.

ENEMY LINES ARE SEVERED BY RUSSIANS

Several Villages taken and Fifteen Hundred More Prisoners —Greek Declaration Expected.

Petrograd, Sept. 29.—On the southern portion of the Russian front, General Brussiloff's army continues to make progress. The enemy's lines of communication have been severed and several villages have been occupied by the Russians and other important territory has been captured.

Fifteen hundred more Austro-Germans have been made prisoners, making a total of 420,000 prisoners taken since the commencement of the big offensive on this front.

Greek Situation.

Athens, Sept. 29.—A Greek declaration of war on Bulgaria is expected hourly. Prince George, the brother of King Constantine, has been recalled from London, England.

Chancellor's Speech.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The Imperial Chancellor, Von Bethmann-Hollweg, delivered his eagerly awaited address in the Reichstag yesterday. He discussed the intervention of Italy and Rumania in the war.

BIG HALIBUT PRICES

The crew of the Star were happy men last night. In Petersburg, Alaska, where 5 cents was offered for halibut, they picked up the fares of three small schooners and brought them here where they sold for just double the price offered in the north. The Alvilda brought in 11,000 and the Volunteer 17,000, all of which made ten cents per pound. The two latter boats will go south to Seattle to lay up for the winter after a most successful summer's fishing.
