## THE AWAKENING

The Toronto Globe has the following to say regarding the awakening of the public conscience, as evidenced by the revolution in British Columbia.

One of the members elected to the Legislature of British Columbia in the recent political revolution writes to a friend in the East: "Nothing is more inspiring than to see how this hopelessly boom-crazed people of five years ago have been driven to their knees and have brought forth a new faith and a new passion for honesty. I look forward with thankfulness to the prospect of public service under such conditions."

Not in British Columbia alone, but in every province of the Dominion, and in the Federal arena, there are evidences of a new faith and a new passion for honesty. The moral awakening of the Canadian people was long delayed, but it has come at last. The grafters, the hoodlums, the manipulators of contracts, the corrupt railway promoter whose power for evil has been incalculably great, have had their day. From every government hereafter, Liberal or Conservative, there will be demanded a new passion for honesty. The man who obtains a dollar of the people's money will be expected to return a dollar's worth of service. The bribery of the electors with their own money must cease, and the politician who seeks to lengthen his tenure of office by squandering the resources of the country must be given short shrift.

And with this new passion for honesty in politics there is coming a new faith in democracy and a determination that government of the people by the people shall not be defeated through the machinations of entrenched privilege. The sweeping-out of the liquor traffic is one of the first fruits of this new political faith. The extension of the suffrage to

women in the Western Provinces is another. The social reform measures that bulk more largely year by year in political programs mark one line of advance. The determination of the Liberals of the west to wage uncompromising warfare on the high protection policy that breeds trusts and combines, which have put the cost of living in Canada so high that the average man can do no more than make both ends meet, indicate another. The attitude of the West heartens those who have fought for a generation against a tariff that hamstringed agriculture and promotes the unhealthy growth of great cities.

The advocates of railway nationalization raise their heads in both parties and declare that railways built almost entirely with public money or by public bond guarantees ought to be taken over and operated in the interests of the people of Canada. The abolition of the curse of patronage in the appointment of all men and women to the civil service of the Dominion and the provinces is demanded. The secret opening of tenders and awarding of contracts—a source of great and far-reaching abuse—can no more be defended in the case of the larger departments of provincial and national affairs than in regard to municipal contracts. The general utilization for the public benefit of the waterpowers, lands, forests, and mines within the illimitable Crown domains of the Dominion and the Provinces will be a cardinal feature of the new politics.

The speculative holder of lands, waterpowers, forests, and other natural resources has been almost as great a curse to the Canadian people as the distillery and the brewery. The natural opportunities of the Dominion must be made easily available to the worker or capitalist who desires to use them in the production of wealth, and altogether inac-

A good many of the old type of politicians who have gumshoed their way around these great issues will have to be discarded if the new faith and the new passion for honesty of which the British Columbian speaks are to find expression in the statute books. They will fight for the old ways and the old dishonesties and the old compromises, but theirs will inevitably be a losing fight. The dead hand must be loosed from the helm if the ship of State is to avoid shipwreck.
