IMPORTANT FRENCH GAIN NEAR PERONNE

WASHINGTON EMBROILED IN NAVAL DEBATE -- RUSSIANS GET TWO SUBMARINES

HEAVY GERMAN CASUALTIES AT CHAULNES WOOD

French Bend Back German Line and Take Twelve Hundred Prisoners—Greeks Have Another Premier.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Oct. 11.—The French have bent back the German lines on a front extending for two miles and a half just south of Peronne, straightening out their line in this region and bringing nearer the final attack on this stronghold.

The village of Bovent, on the outskirts of Ablaincourt, is now in the hands of the French, who also occupy most of Chaulnes Wood. The Germans lost twelve hundred prisoners and their casualties were particularly heavy, as they put up a stubborn fight, especially at Chaulnes Wood.

German Credit.

Amsterdam, Oct. 11.—The German Reichstag is requesting that another war credit of twelve billion marks be passed at the present session of the house.

Another Greek Premier.

Athens, October 11.—Professor Spyridor Lambros has been appointed premier and has succeeded in forming a cabinet. The new cabinet includes several university professors and is separated entirely from the recent political strife.

HON. BOB EXPLAINS

Mayor McCaffery this morning received a letter from Hon. Robert Rogers, in which he acknowledges receipt of M. P. Cotton's letter in regard to the drydock. RUSSIANS SINK SUBMARINES IN BALTIC BATTLE

Subs. Attacked Wireless Station Off Murman Coast—Allied Gains in Balkans—Huns Gain Near Lutsk.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Christiania, Norway, Oct. 11.—A Russian torpedo boat sank two German submarines in the Baltic. The submarines had attacked a wireless station off the Murman coast and had killed several persons by their gun fire.

Balkan Gains.

London, Oct. 11.—The Teutonic forces have evacuated Chavadar Mah, Ormanli and Haznartar on the Balkan front, while the British have also captured Kalendra Homondos from the Bulgarians.

Allied aeroplanes carried out a successful bombardment of Monastir, causing considerable damage.

In the fighting northwest of the Struma River, the Serbians captured eight hundred prisoners.

German Success.

Petrograd, Oct. 11.—The Germans have driven the Russians from their advanced positions to the northwest of Lutsk, in the meantime holding up the drive for Lemberg from this direction.

In Transylvania.

Bucharest, Oct. 11.—The Germans are closely pursuing the retreating Rumanians, who continue to fall back along the whole line. Eleven hundred and twenty-five Rumanians and five cannon have been captured and the fort of Kronstadt is again in German hands.

WEDDING BELLS

Mr. and Mrs. Lee are receiving the congratulations of many friends.

DRYDOCK BUSY

The drydock will be busy very shortly on a job which will last for a few weeks. This work has no bearing whatever on the Cotton lease and did not interfere in the slightest with the carrying out of that agreement, which was for work covering a period of at least two years. Once the dock is occupied, the government will probably admit that it is completed.

WASHINGTON IS EMBROILED IN NAVAL DEBATE

British Writers Assert that the United States Should have Refused to Countenance Submarine Campaign.

London, October 11.—Naval writers maintain that the United States government cannot fairly countenance the carrying of the German submarine campaign into territory adjacent to the home waters of that country, after having registered a protest to the British government against the patrolling of British cruisers near the American coast, in watching for the submarine Deutschland.

The fact that Washington protested against the action of the British naval authorities on that occasion was withheld until the recent submarine activities by the Germans raised the entire question.

Further Notes.

Washington, October 11.—The United States government refuses to accept the contention of the Entente Allies urging that neutral nations deny the use of their harbors to all submarines, whether they may be merchantmen or warships.

Destroyers Return.

Newport, October 11.—Twelve United States torpedo boat destroyers, failing to locate the crew of the steamer Kingston, which was torpedoed by a German submarine on Sunday, have been ordered to return to port.

ALASKAN PIONEER MISSIONARY HERE

Rev. David Waggoner, of the Presbyterian Church of Alaska, passed through the city this forenoon on his way to Juneau. Mr. Waggoner, who has been in Alaska for fifteen years, has been attending the Synod at Everett, Washington. Though now located in Juneau, Mr. Waggoner is one of the real pioneers of Alaska, having roughed it years ago throughout the country which was looked upon as a wilderness at that time.

Much of Mr. Waggoner's time is taken up with the training of the Indians of Alaska along various lines and he has many interesting and amusing stories to tell of his early experiences amongst the natives.

SURF INLET BOOMING

Vancouver, Oct. 9.—Mining up Surf Inlet way is in a prosperous state and there is every prospect of a good yield in the coming months. Mr. F. Bradshaw told The Province today on his return from the property. He will leave for Tonopah, Nevada, tonight, the headquarters of the company. In the past twelve months there was a greater output of silver at Surf Inlet than at their mines in Nevada and the Nevada mine has led the mines in the United States for the previous year. This showed, said Mr. Bradshaw, that the property they had in British Columbia was a very valuable one and with the plans that they had in view for its further development, he anticipated that the yield would be equal to anything that they had ever experienced.
