## ULTIMATUM GIVES ATHENS FORTY-EIGHT HOURS -- ITALIANS RESUME ATTACK

# ALLIES REFUSE TO WAIT LONGER THAN TWO DAYS

Greece Given Forty-eight Hours to Hand Over Fleet and Give up Railway-Minister Will Comply.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 12 .- A Reuter's despatch from Athens states that Vice-Admiral Du Fournet, the French officer who is commanding the Anglo-French battle fleet in the Mediterranean, has presented an ultimatum to Greece cepting the cruiser Averoff and the battleships Lemnos and Kilkis, which are ordered to be dis-armed. The ultimatum also calls SOLDIERS SMASHED for the surrender of the Piraeus-Larissa railway, which forms the back-bone of all communication lines through the centre of Greece

within forty-eight hours.



Britain Passes Huge New War Loan-German Losses Over Three Millions-Old Men Are Called Up.

London, October 12:-Premier Asquith, in moving the thirteenth British war vote of three hundred million pounds in the House of Commons yesterday, said that he has estimated Great Britain's daily war expenditure at five million pounds.


