A CONTRAST

In dealing with the recent disclosures in connection with the raising of the tender for the building of the Manitoba Agricultural College, in which Hon. Robert Rogers played his usual part, the Toronto Globe makes the following contrast between the past and the present Canadian politics.

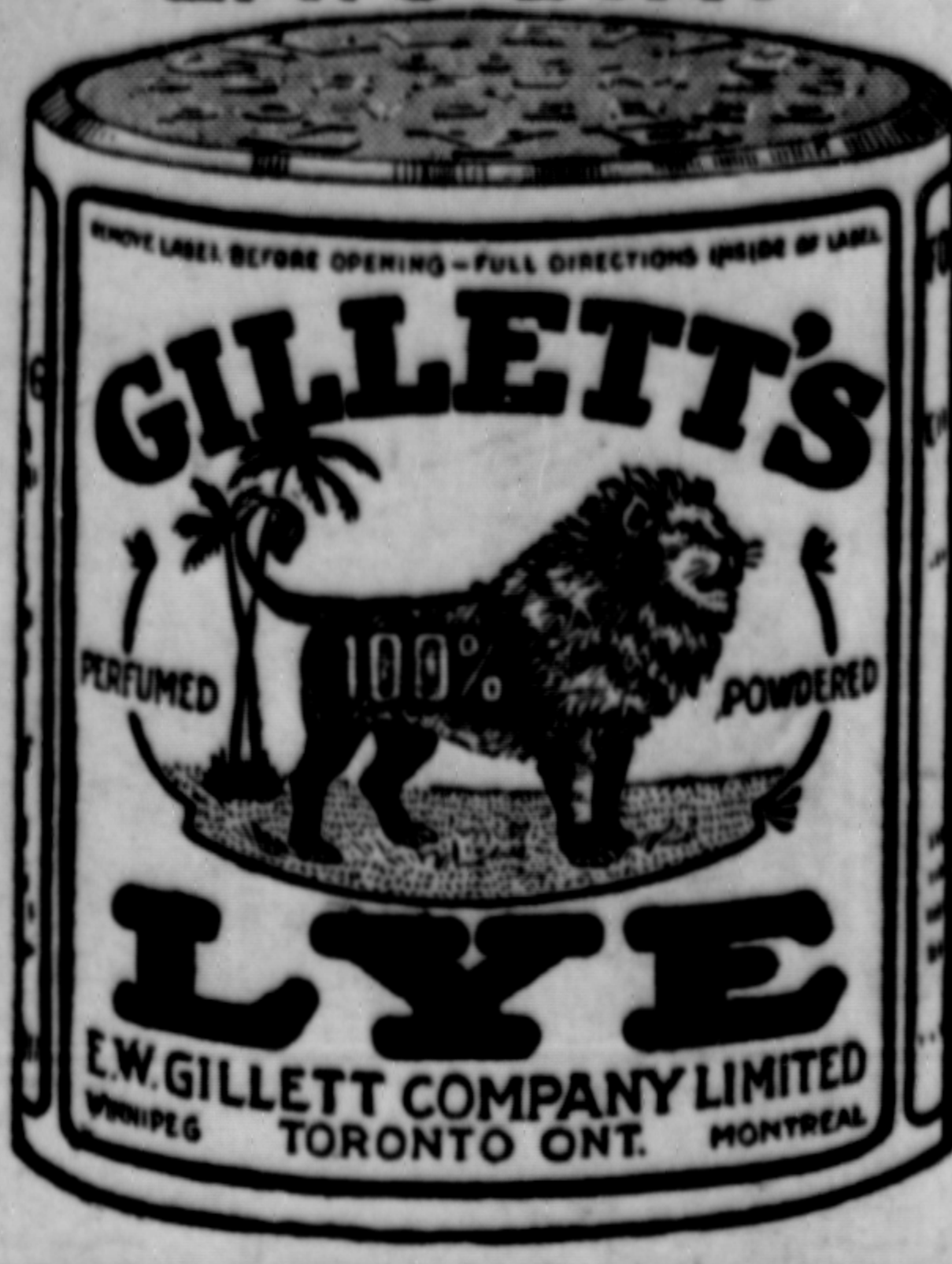
Those who earnestly believe that the "former times were better than these" may find some justification for their opinion in a half century old but still instructive Parliamentary episode. In the Legislative Assembly of the old Province of Canada the Sanfield Macdonald Reform Government of 1862-64 was forced to resign and the Tache Conservative Government took its place. Of this Ministry Mr. A. T. Galt, one of Canada's most eminent public men of that or any other time, was Minister of Finance. Mr. John A. Macdonald was Attorney-General West, and Mr. George E. Cartier was Attorney-General East. When this Cabinet was exactly a month old it fell most ignominiously on a motion of want of confidence made by Mr. Antoine A. Dorion, leader of the Lower Canadian Reformers in Opposition and supported by a sufficient number of Conservatives to defeat the Government. Curiously enough its condemnation was on account of a former Conservative Ministry's loan of a hundred thousand dollars to the corporation of Montreal, and meanwhile another and totally different Ministry had intervened for two whole years. The hostile majority vote was aimed at Mr. Galt for what was a foolish and not a corrupt transaction, but it brought the whole Cabinet with him.

The sensitiveness of public opinion then contrasts favorably with its habitual and regrettable complaisance now. Such a transaction as that avowed and defended recently by Mr. Rogers on the witness stand would have caused the instant retirement of the perpetrator. There never was a precedent for the act of a Minister of Public Works who suggested to a contractor with his department that he should add to his tender, the sequel being a visit from a Treasurer, through whom the contractor paid back most of the additional amount into his party's election fund. It will be borne in mind that a quarter of a century ago the late Sir John Thompson, as Premier, forced out of the House of Commons one of his own supporters for discreditable business conduct in a private transaction. One is tempted to ask what Sir John Thompson would have said to Mr. Rogers on his return from Winnipeg after giving his evidence in the Manitoba scandal case. It is safe to say he would have asked for the portfolio of Public Works within five minutes after their first meeting. Sir John Thompson was a Nova Scotian statesman, and Sir Robert Borden professes to be one.

TAYLOR STILL HAS MAYORALTY AMBITIONS

Prince George, Oct. 19.—L. D. Taylor, former mayor of Vancouver, former owner of the World newspaper there, and defeated candidate for various offices, will run for mayor of Prince George next January, it is understood. He is now editor and part owner of the Prince George Citizen, a semi-weekly paper. Other candidates mentioned are Harry G. Perry, former president of the Board of Trade, an old timer; H. A. Carney, city assessor, and J. T. Armstrong, one of the present aldermen.

HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The schooner Seattle brought in 60,000 pounds of halibut yesterday; the Nellie, 3,000; the Daisy, 1,000, and the Starrett, of the Cold Storage Company, 10,000 pounds of black cod and 10,000 of halibut. The independent boats sold to the Cold Storage Company at 9 1/2 cents.

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT MUNICIPAL VOTERS TAKE NOTICE

The following classes of voters should be careful to take the necessary steps to register, otherwise their names will not appear on the list.

These steps are:—
(1) Householders, namely, men who have paid Road Tax and are otherwise qualified, must, during October, make the Declaration required.

(2) Persons holding Trade Licences must also file Declarations during October.
(3) Persons holding land under Agreements for Sale must also file Declarations, showing particulars of Agreements, before the end of November.

(4) The City Clerk, in order to convenience voters, will attend every Wednesday and Friday evening during this month, from 7 o'clock until 9:30 o'clock, to take Declarations.

(5) Voters will greatly facilitate matters if those voting on Road Tax bring their receipts with them, and those claiming to vote on Agreements bring their Agreements with them.
