COST OF LIVING

Ever since the outbreak of the war there has been a steady increase in the cost of many commodities in Canada and in most other countries. The greatest advances were in Britain where such articles as sugar, wheat, and other staples are imported, the former, before the war, being brought largely from Austria and Germany. As business men are in business for the purpose of making money, and that purpose only, naturally the shortage of supply created an enormous increase in prices. Many steamers were commandeered by the Admiralty, resulting in a great shortage of ocean tonnage. The simple result was an immediate and tremendous advance in freight rates, bringing in its train a further huge advance in the prices of all imported commodities.

The British government very promptly took action in regard to flour and sugar, and assumed control of the supplies and prices, fixing the quantity to be carried by the wholesaler and the prices at which these lines were to be sold. It worked a great hardship on many of the wholesalers, but it benefited the consumer, and the jobber was patriotic enough to consider his losses as part of the cost of the war which he had to carry.

Action in regard to freight rates was slower in coming, but, when it did come, it was drastic, the government taking seventy per cent of all surplus profits so that though the consumer still paid high prices, he was relieved of a large slice of the cost of the war by this big tax.

Coming nearer home, we find that, in Canada, the govern-

ment has looked on complacently while the cost of living has mounted steadily higher, but, within the last few days, Ottawa has at last been stirred up sufficiently to make enquiries, and the various public bodies are to bring in reports as to costs of the different commodities before the war and now, with a view to estimating the general rise in cost of living.

As manufacturers and jobbers are not in business for their health but simply to make money, the government will find that the Canadian public has been made to pay through the nose for many things. Take shoes for instance. A shoe which cost \$5 before the war now costs \$6. It is admitted that there is an increase in the demand for shoes as a result of the war, not because more people are wearing shoes but because shoes wear out quickly at the front, especially if they are poor shoes to start with, and the factories in the Dominion are loaded down with more orders than they are able to fill. Retailers are still waiting for orders placed last July to be filled and prices are creeping up steadily. It is predicted that shoes will be selling at \$10 per pair within six months, and, if the manufacturers get their way, they certainly will.

The government does not need to waste time going into figures in connection with the cost of living. The figures are there and very easily found. What should be gone into is the total available leather supply in Canada and the number of shoes required from the Dominion, in addition to the demand of normal times. Wheat supplies should be estimated in the same way and the method

should be extended to every line, with a view to arriving at a fair idea of the whole economic situation within the Dominion. Many shoe manufacturers are paying largely increased prices for raw material but there are others who are getting rich quick at the expense of the wage-earner. All speculation in wheat and other food supplies should be stopped and prices brought down to a business level. It is a crime that at any time men should be allowed to gamble with the food of the people, but, at a time like the present, it is an aggravated offence and the man who does it is an enemy of his country just as the German is. There is ample room for enquiry, and it is to be hoped that the enquiry is prosecuted down to the very root of the matter, and prompt action taken when the enquiry is ended.

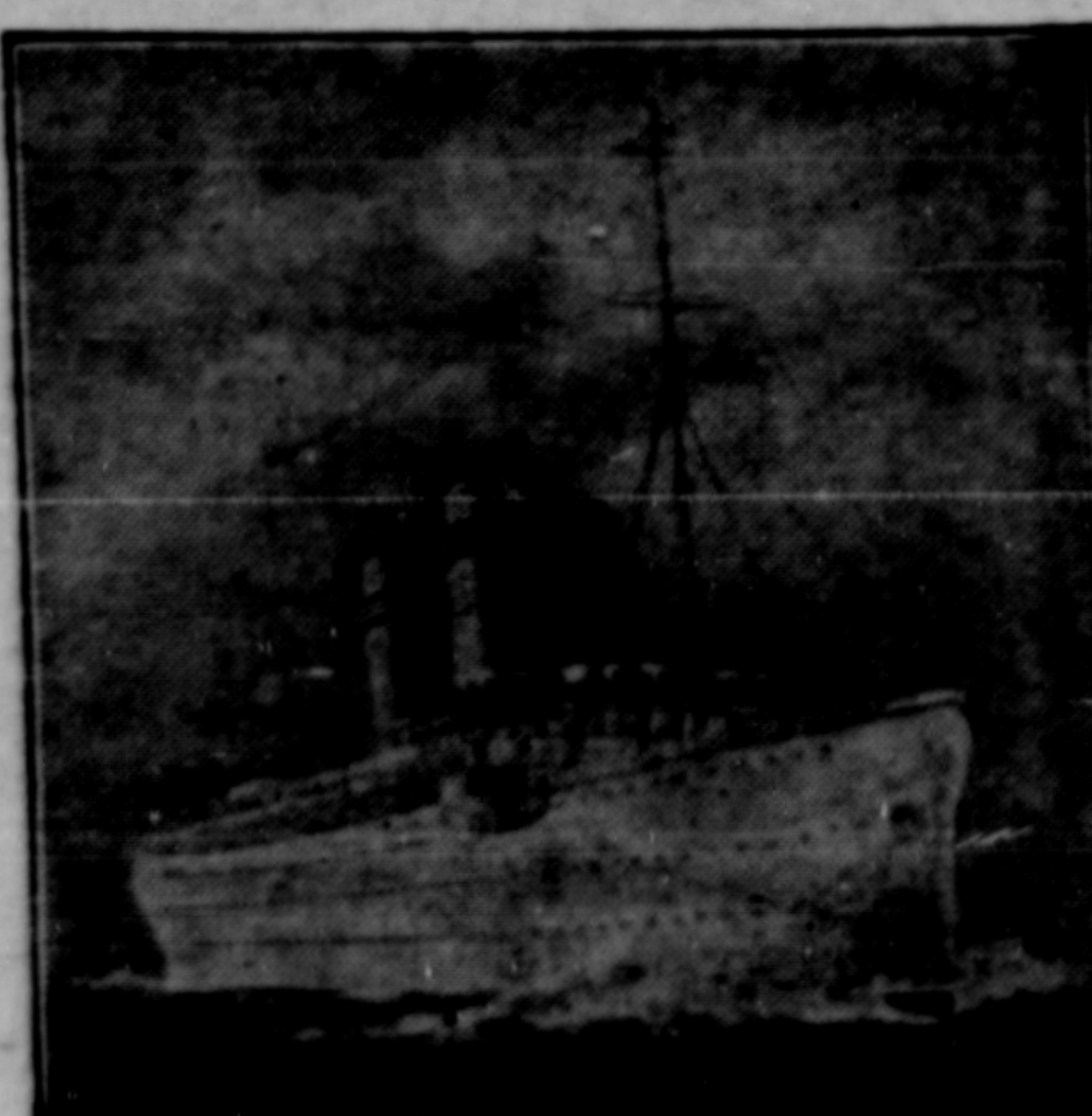
