YOUNG CANADA

Every old timer of Prince Rupert who was privileged to sit in the auditorium of the Westholme Theatre on Tuesday evening must, as he looked on the hundreds of bright school children, have found his mind reverting to the days when the school children of this young city could be counted on the fingers. Eight years ago, Prince Rupert was a railroad camp, and a man's town rather than a place for children. The pioneer has done his work; homes have been hewn out of the solid rock, as it were, and hundreds of pairs of tiny feet patter along to and from school over ground which was a few years ago primeval forest and swamp. The jungle has given place to the neighborhood and the foundations of another outpost of the last Great West have been firmly and surely laid. The majority of the men who helped to lay the foundations are gone; many of them overseas to fight for the Empire they have helped to build, and others to the mountains and the creeks in search of the world's secrets, chiefly because towns and cities have no attraction for them.

Family life has succeeded pioneer life and the places of the frontiersmen of civilization have been taken by Prince Rupert's first generation of citizens. The future of Prince Rupert is wrapped up in the minds and characters of the budding manhood and womanhood which are being trained in our schools. The hope of Prince Rupert, of Canada and the Empire lies in its children. The British population is small and the British Empire is wide. People have come in from other nations to help develop it and they are welcomed.

The children are doubly welcome. The children in our schools have sprung from many different nations but they are all Canadians and will help to build up Canada as a nation within the Empire.

On the teachers of Canada rests a tremendous responsibility, which is shared with the parents of the Dominion. The children, looking out with eyes wide with wonder on the epoch-making happenings of the present, are the citizens and legislators of the future. Future cabinet ministers met on the school platforms of Canada on Tuesday night to help alleviate the sufferings of the little children of Belgium. Who can attempt to estimate the far-reaching effects of that occasion?

Our pioneers laid the foundations of a city; our teachers are laying the foundations of a nation. On their upbuilding of the minds and characters of the children of Canada depends the future history of the Dominion. It is well that the children should be banded together to do what they can in the interests of liberty, equality and justice. The whole world is in the melting pot; the children are looking on, and their receptive little minds are learning the lessons of the times in which they live. On their learning that truth and righteousness alone exalteth a nation depends the future of the Dominion of Canada and the British Empire.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR INDIAN CHILDREN.

Rev. Father Bunoz reports that the Catholic Mission at Fort St. James, in the Peace River country, is establishing an industrial and boarding school for Indian boys and girls. For the present, the mission building, which will accommodate fifty children, will be utilized. The organization work is in the hands of Father Allard, formerly of Prince Rupert.

The mission has a half section of agricultural land and another half section adjoining can be used later if required. The territory from which scholars will be drawn is that lying between Hazelton and Prince George. The school will be formally opened on New Year's Day.
