NS LOST THREE ZEPPELINS IN

AMERICANS INTERNED IN TURKEY -- GERMANS ARE DRAWING NEAR BUCHAREST

GERMANS LOST THREE AIRSHIPS IN RECENT RAID

Two Destroyed-by British Guns and French Get One Near Dunkirk-Women and Children Hurt.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 29 .- The official Admiralty report on Monday's Zeppelin raid on the northeast coast of England states that the enemy airships dropped one hundred bombs. One woman died of shock, and five men, seven women and four children were injured. Several homes were damaged.

The deadly new antiaircraft guns of the British shot two of the Zeppelins into the sea in flames. The crews of both ships perished.

French Get One.

Paris, Nov. 29.—Réports from Dunkirk state that a German airship was brought down there on Tuesday afternoon. It carried two German naval lieutenants who were possessed of a large scale map of the city of London.

- The Hague, Nov. 29.—Belgian refugees arriving here state that Germany fears an uprising of the civilian population of Belgium, owing to the fact that the German garrisons have been depleted in order to release men for active service, and that that is one of the reasons for the deportation of Belgian laborers to Germany. Three hundred thousand men and boys have been sent to Germany from Antwerp.
