by the government's food profiteering friends. Sustain her as you will with separation allowances, patriotic funds, and so on, the cost of living more than keeps pace with her dollar shrunken to two-thirds of its face value. The cost of living goes ahead by leaps and bounds—the war being the excuse—and the government does nothing to the leapers and bounders except to threaten them with an order-in-council, which makes four bites of a cherry and thus gives the looters time to get away with the swag. The food profiteer never seems to think that he ought to take his medicine with the rest of us and cut down his profits during war time and, of course, the Borden government would never think of mentioning it to him. Let your food hog persist in his swinishness.

Let him that is greedy, be greedy still, and the Borden government will do its best to help him.

There is no doubt that this is a loyal government—loyal, for example, to its meat packing friends. Moreover, it believes in sacrifice—that is to say, sacrificing the consumer to the food profiteers. It would sacrifice the last man and the last dollar to that good cause. Its heart's desire is to remain in power till the last man is starved to death and the last dollar is shaken out of him.—H. F.
