GERMAN PEACE OFFER FINDS LITTLE FAVOR

Westminster Gazette Urges Careful Consideration—Austrian Cabinet Resigns-German Losses.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 14.—The German peace proposals are being regarded with little favor, but there is some indication that the first impulse of irritation may be succeeded by a more Conservative view. The Westminister Gazette, one of the most influential London papers, urges a careful consideration of Germany's proposals. It says that the situation calls for a high degree of British statesmanship and the laying down of a carefully planned constructive policy.
