**ROUSING SPEECHES
AT RECRUITING MEETING**

(Continued From Page One.)

less the men were forthcoming,
the Allied armies at Saloniki
would be driven into the sea and
that Calais would yet be taken.

Col. Guthrie.

On rising to speak, Col. Guthrie
was received with three ringing
cheers and a tiger. He said that
much had been said of what the
men had done, but he wanted to
tell them that the women in
France and Flanders had done
more. He said "There is a lady
in this hall tonight who has done
great work at the front, and I am
going on strike until she is hon-
ored." Mrs. Godenrath was con-
ducted to the platform amid
cheers.

Col. Guthrie then told of how,
after lying unconscious for seven
days he woke up in hospital to
find Ms. Godenrath nursing him
back to life. It took six weeks of
tireless work to get him fit enough
to be sent home on a stretcher.
He paid a "high tribute to the
noble work which is being done
by the women of Canada.

After paying fitting tribute to
the work of the navy, which stood
between Britain and defeat, he
said he had listened to stories of
Prince Rupert, morning, noon and
night from Mr. Godenrath and he
had now seen it. After the war,
we might look for French, Ger-
man and Belgian immigrants in
large numbers as all who had
come in contact with Mr. Goden-
rath had been told all about the
wonders of Prince Rupert.

He called on all who did not
care to join the army to call upon
Sailor Burke, in whom he recog-
nized a pugilist hero of his boy-
hood days.

After stating that the war to-
day is a combat of science against
science and big guns against big
guns, he said that the only fair
method of raising an army was
by conscription. It had been said
by some that this is Britain's
war but he assured them that it
was Canada's war and that, if
Britain were beaten, it would be
worse for Canada than for the
old country. The men who re-
fused to fight against Germany
today, might be forced to fight
for Germany in the future. He
called on every man to rally round
the old flag. "We must rally
round it and see it planted by the
hands of Haig at the gates of
Berlin," said the colonel in a
burst of impassioned oratory
which brought forth great cheers.

He said that Lloyd George was
the right man to take hold of
things and that the muzzle would
now be torn from the navy and
there would be something doing
both on sea and land. (Cheers).
He then went on to describe in
graphic terms the terrible three
days and nights on the Ypres
salient when the Canadians saved
the situation. He told of deeds
of heroism done by Major Geggie,
Major Sturdee and Lieut. Seely.
He drew a vivid and ghastly pic-
ture of the first German gas at-
tack, when the Turks were
routed and the Canadians came
to the rescue. When they were
all but beaten, the message came,
"The eyes of the Empire are on
you, Canadians. Calais is at
stake. Hang on," and to their
everlasting glory they hung on
with tears streaming down their
seamed faces.

The colonel concluded a mag-
nificent speech by calling upon
every available man to join the
Kilties, the Bantams, the Navy or
any other unit of the service.
"Seven thousand men are falling
every month, and only four thou-
sand are enlisting," he said.
"Your comrades call you to help
them. The silent cry that comes
from the bottom of the Atlantic
calls you, and the shriek of the
outraged women of Belgium and
France demands that you go over
to help drive back the Hun," de-

Rainbow, and how British Colum-
bia immediately bought subma-
rines, which action was author-
ized by Ottawa immediately, so
that its cities could be protected.

Continuing, Sir Wilfrid Laurier
said, "If I recall these facts it is
not for the pleasure of justifying
our policy, or for the purpose of
party politics, I am not here to
talk politics, but with a higher
thought.

"Some people say that we
should defend only our own ter-
ritory. Why should our children
go to fight for England? To fight
for England. What an injustice!
"For whom is England waging
war today? It was not England
which was invaded in August,
1914. It was not on England that
Germany declared war on August
1st, but it was England that on
August 4th declared war on Ger-
many to save Belgium, to save
France, and against the German
Empire." (Cheers).

At the conclusion of a stirring
appeal to every young Canadian
to do his share in the fight for
justice and liberty, Sir Wilfrid
was presented with a floral crown
by Martin Madden, member of the
legislature for West Quebec.

Lieutenant Chamel, a returned
French officer, made an appeal
for all young men present to join
the ranks of a French-Canadian
battalion.
