INTERESTING ADDRESS BY MRS. GODENRATH

(Continued From Page One.)

ready to go back to finish their work." Mrs. Godenrath said that too much could not be said in praise of the work done by the Y. M. C. A. On every front, this organization is working night and day for the welfare of the boys, and it is practical assistance which is given, though the spiritual side is not forgotten. Mrs. Godenrath said a lot had been said about the religion of the trenches. She did not know much about it, but she did know that scarcely a man entered upon a charge without first praying to God, and thousands of men who had never prayed before were doing so now.

The Spirit of the Men.

The speaker described the spirit of the officers and men as magnificent. Each thought the other was more badly wounded than himself and there were many remarkable instances of officers making light of grievous wounds that their men might be attended to first. They were all cheerful, no matter how severely wounded. Mrs. Godenrath also paid a high tribute to the voluntary aid department which furnished 28,000 beds within twenty-four hours of the outbreak of the war and was now taking care of 68,000, all by voluntary subscription. In the same way, relatives of wounded men were taken over to France; taken to the hospitals where their loved ones lay and housed at an hotel free of charge. If they were able to contribute to the funds, they did so, but, if they could not, it was all the same.

France.

Dealing with the part played by France, the speaker said it was magnificent to see a nation so whole-hearted in the great cause. The soldiers of France receive no money, it is all "For France." Every boy and every man up to 60 is doing his share and, as in England, the women are doing even more. The women are plowing, sowing and reaping in the fields, and doing men's work in every line of industry that their sons, brothers, and husbands may be free to fight the enemy.

Canada's Part.

Reverting to Canada, Mrs. Godenrath said, "We want your prayers, for the men at the front know when the people at home are forgetting to pray for them. You must pray for us, but you must also fight the enemy in your midst." Mrs. Godenrath spoke very strongly regarding the leniency with which alien enemies are treated in Canada, and drew a comparison with the treatment of our men in Germany, many of whom have been ruined for life. Speaking of the need for men and the question of Canadians going over there to fight and leaving their places to be filled with aliens, the speaker said that this need not trouble any man. The one essential was to win the war. When that had been done, we would be on top and would be able to deal with the aliens who were left here. In conclusion, Mrs. Godenrath called for every effort on the part of the ladies in keeping up and increasing the supply of hospital supplies and also called on every man to do his part.

FIDDLER CREEK ROAD HAS BEEN COMPLETED
