stood they would be treated differently. He called for a mutual understanding as a means of solving the problems. He felt that Premier Lloyd George had done well in appointing the Labor leader to his cabinet.

O. H. Neson, in a humorous vein, told of the occasions when he had supported Mr. Pattullo and of the occasions on which he had opposed him. When they differed, they did so good naturedly. If the Minister behaved himself and lived up to the best traditions of the party which was formerly in power, everything would be lovely. He hoped it was not a case of taking farewell of Mr. Pattullo. His friends, whether Conservative, Liberal or Labor, would miss him but their hearty good wishes would go with him in his new position. He had always believed that the Premier would honor this city as he had done and no one rejoiced more than he did that it had been so. "We are told to weep with those who weep, and rejoice with those who rejoice," I have done the one and am now doing the other," said Mr. Nelson amid laughter. He wished Mr. Pattullo every success and expressed regret that the city was temporarily losing Mr. Pattullo and Mrs. Pattullo and family.

Fred. Stork, Dominion Liberal candidate for Skeena-Atlin, said it was a great pleasure to attend a non-partisan political gathering. He was delighted to see so many ladies present and hoped that they would attend future meetings in large numbers as their presence had a great influence in raising the tone of political gatherings. The fact that there were so many sides of opinion represented at the meeting told of the broadness of Mr. Pattullo's views. After expressing great regret that the city was losing, for a time, the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Pattullo and family, Mr. Stork dwelt upon the history of the Pattullos of Woodstock. In choosing a representative of that family for a post in his cabinet, Premier Brewster had made a wise choice. He felt from the bottom of his heart that the confidence which the people had placed in Mr. Pattullo was not misplaced.

Dealing with the many problems which confront us today, he dwelt upon the placing of our returned soldiers as the most important. He did not want to see the same conditions here as obtained in the States after the war. He thought that the men from the trenches would not be content to remain in the old ruts but that the call of the west would draw them here. While realizing that the problem was big, he had the utmost confidence in leaving the matter to the sound judgment of Mr. Pattullo. He wished Mr. and Mrs. Pattullo a very happy New Year in their sojourn in Victoria.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who was sitting beside the audience, was then invited to the platform, but he said he preferred to remain near the people and he hoped to find himself still close to them four years hence. He took it as a personal tribute that so many had come there to welcome him, but he also realized it was a tribute to British institutions and that they were honoring the Minister of Lands rather than himself.

He was delighted to find that Mayor McCaffery had decided to sacrifice his own business interests to take the mayoralty for (Continued on Page four.)

LEATHER LIMITED: RUBBER SUPPLY STEADY

Comparison of Supply Makes Answer to Footwear Problem Simple for Economical Persons. Wear Rubbers and Overshoes

There is a limit to the shoe leather that a cow can provide, but the world's production of rubber today is almost level as far as the requirements of the rubber-using part of the world is concerned, and that is the average person's answer to, at least, one part of the high-cost-of-living problem.

The thrifty man or woman will wear rubber this winter. Rubbers and overshoes will be worn for two reasons—first, because they are a means of protecting the health, and, second, because rubbers solve the question of wear and tear on the leather, whose cost has increased because the cow can provide only so much. A cow hides costs almost as much now as a whole cow did before the war. Rubber costs just half as much as it did before the war. The British Government gave us cheap rubber—why not be patriotic, and at the same time economical, and wear rubbers?
