### BOARD OF TRADE ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

(Continued From Page One.)  
Mr. Mortimer stated that the halibut receipts at Prince Rupert in 1916 were 20,417,800 pounds and the salmon catch totalled 21,933,100 pounds. Customs receipts show an increase of \$51,000 over last year.  
David H. Hays congratulated Mr. Mortimer on the concise manner in which he had drawn up his report, which covered much ground clearly and in few words. He moved a vote of thanks to the commissioner, and expressed regret that finances did not permit of the report being published.

### ATTENTION RATEPAYERS!

A bylaw to maintain a reserve to ensure prompt payment of instalments on our debt-bond is to be voted on by you on the 14th January.  
We submit the following reasons in favor of said bylaw:—  
(1) The reserve fund has already been established this year, and has in practice been shown a great success.  
(2) There always has been, and always will be, a shortage in collection of special rates for local improvement and other by-laws, which shortage has heretofore been made good from general revenue, but to do this the City has often been required to borrow from the bank, and always to place in the yearly estimates a sum to meet this shortage. With the reserve established we will neither have to borrow nor estimate.  
(3) Instead of borrowing from the bank at six (6) per cent our reserve will receive the benefit of delinquent interest, and will pay to general fund six (6) per cent per annum on the whole amount of such reserve, and this will in fact reduce taxation to the extent of nearly Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00).  
(4) The scheme has been heartily endorsed by Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, General-Manager of the Bank of Montreal, also by the largest bond houses in Canada, as well as the Bond Dealers' Association of Canada.  
(5) We believe that the establishment of this reserve will materially increase the selling price of any bonds we may hereafter issue, and will have a far-reaching effect in the general financing of the City in the future.  
(6) The City Treasurer will be happy to show to any ratepayer detailed reports and full explanation of the whole matter, and also the letters of commendation received.  
(7) Clearly remember not one dollar of this reserve will be raised by extra taxation.

## NATIONAL SERVICE

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given under the authority of the "War Measures Act, 1914," that during the first week in January, 1917, an inventory will be made by the Post Office Authorities, of every male between the ages of sixteen and sixty-five, residing in Canada.

National Service Cards and addressed envelopes for their return to Ottawa have been placed in the hands of all Postmasters for distribution amongst the persons required to fill in such cards.
