RETURNED SOLDIERS

To all those who witnessed the battle scenes from the Somme front at the Westholme last night, one of the predominant thoughts must have been, What can we ever do to repay those brave fellows for what they have done and are doing for us? It is to help solve this big problem that Premier Brewster has gone to Ottawa to confer with Premier Borden and the premiers of the various provinces. It is the biggest problem which Canada has ever faced, if we except the work of carrying on her share of the war. Next in importance to the winning of the war, is the care of the men who have helped to win it.

The provincial government has pledged itself to place as many of these men as possible in the civil service, and it is only right that this should be done, wherever possible. Especially in the outside branches there should be many positions found for our returned men. Most of them, after the life of the trenches, will not care to tie themselves to desks, and British Columbia in particular should be able to provide places of useful service to many of them.

It is impossible that all or even a large proportion of the returned soldiers can be placed by the government and it is up to the various municipalities and employers of labor generally to employ them wherever possible. It is true that many of the men will be hard to place, particularly those who have been seriously disabled, but for these special training, as is being given in France, may work wonders.

Premier Brewster, in his campaign speeches, made it very plain that one of the first

duties of his government would be to plan for the care of the returned soldiers and, as in all the other pledges made by Mr. Brewster, we may rest assured he will live up to his promises. The soldiers have formed strong associations throughout the country, which will do much toward taking care of the men until they find work, but the important part is the finding of work. After every war there has been a large addition made to the lists of the unemployed. This must not happen in this instance. The municipalities and the large employers of labor must unite with both governments to do everything possible for the soldiers who have fought and suffered for the Empire.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

W. J. Bowser is evidently still feeling sore over his defeat as he refuses to sanction the submitting of a petition to the Imperial Parliament asking that all provincial legislation since March 14th last be made valid. It will be remembered that, as attorney-general, Mr. Bowser made no effort to bring the matter before the courts. He evidently prefers to leave the affairs of the province in the muddle into which he got them.

Sir Max Aitken, Canada's eyewitness at the front, has been created a baron. He takes the title of Baron Beaverbrook, of New Brunswick and Cherkley, in the County of Surrey.

Prof. W. B. Bottomley, of King's College, London, has discovered a wonderful new plant food and fertilizer which is procured from peat. It is believed it will revolutionize agriculture and make the rehabilitation of war-shattered

ed Europe much easier. This may mean another industry for Prince Rupert if its muskeg has the qualities of peat.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, has appointed M. A. Grainger as provincial chief forester. Mr. Grainger has been acting-chief forester since Prof. McMillan resigned two years ago. He is a mathematical wrangler of King's College, Cambridge, and took part in the rush to the Klondyke in '98. Mr. Grainger has done much good work in the Forestry Department, and has published a book on logging on this coast.
