Paris, Jan. 16 .- On the Somme front, the French forces made several surprise attacks last night and captured war material and prisoners. Attacks by small parties are very successful and as many as three hundred prisoners are taken in one night. The Germans attempted to make counterattacks but all failed.

# THOMAS LAWSON DROPS BOMB AT INVESTIGATION

When Forced to Speak Lawson Makes Startling Charges—Says Chairman Gave Him the In-Itial Information.

Washington, Jan. 16 .- Threatened with imprisonment if he continued his refusal to divulge the names of the persons implicated in the stock gambling pool, which profited by advance information regarding the issuing of President Wilson's peace note, Thomas W. Lawson, befere the House Committee on Rules, asserted yesterday that Representative Henry, chairman of the investigation committee, furnished him with the initial information. Secretary McAdoo; H.
