## SHELL PROFITEER SUING FOR RAKE-OFF

New York, Jan. 11.—A munitions contract through which Edgar W. Bassick of this city was to receive approximately \$3,000,000 in commissions, came to light here today when the Aetna Explosives Company obtained an injunction from the Supreme Court restraining Bassick and others from disposing of certain promissory notes and transferring certain stocks pending the trial of a suit brought by the explosives concern.

"Bassick was one of several Americans named by Sir Sam Hughes as having organized big plants to fill the fuse contracts and that they had accepted cash advances of only 15 per cent when the rate of Russian, French and British advances was 25 per cent."

The present suit is the result of contracts said to have been made with the French government by the Aetna Explosives Co. in 1915 and 1916. Bassick, for his services, is said to have received \$644,960 in cash, \$1,700,000 in par value preferred stock of the company, and \$595,595 in promissory notes. Some of the securities and notes, it is alleged, have passed into the hands of others named as co-defendants with Bassick.

The Explosives Company, while admitting its officers entered into the agreement with Bassick and gave him the securities and notes, disclaims responsibility and alleges the officers exceeded their authority by not waiting to have their action ratified by the board of directors. Bassick, however, contends he is entitled to "every penny agreed to be paid him."
