GREEK DUPLICITY

It would appear that the Entente Allies have again been caught napping in Greece. While the French and British forces have been carefully preserving law and order between the opposing factions, King Constantine has evidently been devoting his energies to scheming for the linking up of his troops, with the Turks and Bulgarians in the north, and now that his plans have matured, he will probably bid the Entente a polite good-bye.

The man in the street says, "I told you so" and "the beggars ought to have been shelled out of Athens long ago," but, unfortunately, nations such as the French, Italian and British cannot conduct their negotiations with other powers by the catch-as-catch-can rules, but must follow along the usual lines of diplomacy. In this war, the Allies have come off second best in all diplomatic matters simply because they have played the game according to the recognized rules and, if they have been fooled, they have at least done the honorable thing.

It may appear for the moment that Constantine has gained the advantage, but it is a fleeting victory and can never recompense him or his Royalist supporters for the stigma which will be attached to them down through history. The nations are not playing a game of free fight in the bush, but are making history. Britain today holds the place she does in the eyes of the world because her word is as good as her bond, while Germany and now Greece will not be trusted for generations to come. When the war is over, Germany must get busy to put her commerce in shape again. She will be

obliged to make overtures to every people on the globe.

Greece, on a smaller scale, probably a very much smaller scale, will be obliged to do the same. When that time comes, their conduct in the war will be remembered. Every approach will be received with suspicion, as a result of the duplicity displayed in the past two years and a half. Even viewing the matter from a purely selfish standpoint, national duplicity, like individual duplicity, is poor business.

Constantine's latest and final escapade closes his career as a king and it is an ignominious close, for a man who has admittedly in the past displayed considerable power as a leader. The formation of a Greek republic is only the matter of a short time, as, even if the Italian duke does ascend the throne, he is not likely ever to gain and hold the loyalty of the Greek people. A republic, with Venizelos at its head, will probably be the final outcome of the Constantine episode.

Berlin says the Germans have enough cattle, grain and vegetables. The Germans seem to be very anxious to advertise the fact, yet they claim that the submarine campaign was inaugurated to save the German people from starvation.

General Nivelle and Sir Douglas Haig are evidently preparing to deliver a whole lot of very convincing peace talk to Germany during the coming spring and summer.
