HARNESSING VOLCANO AN ACCOMPLISHED FACT

The harnessing of one of nature's power sources, the water falls, is an old matter. It remained for an Italian engineer to find a new and untouched source of natural power and to utilize it. In Tuscany, today, a volcano has been harnessed and is furnishing power for several industries. In an engineering supplement of the London Times there are the plans presented, showing how 15,000 horse power has been developed and utilized, the details being supplied by President Luigi Luigi, of the Italian Society of Civil Engineers.

It seems that near Volterra, in Central Tuscany, there are numerous cracks in the earth from which powerful jets of very hot steam spout high in the air, bringing up, among other things, boric acid, the recovery of which has become a local industry of importance. In 1903 the first attempts were made to use this steam as a source of motive power and a small reciprocating engine was installed, with the steam jets furnishing the motive power, which in turn was attached to a dynamo, from which the lighting of the boric acid plant was supplied.

Later, to get a more ample supply, pipes were sunk to the source of the steam, which was under a hard stratum of rock 500 feet down. These pipes gave steam with a surface pressure varying from two to five atmospheres. After several years' use it was shown that the steam carrying the acids had a corrosive influence on the engines, necessitating many repairs, so the volcanic steam was used to replace fuel in the creation of pure steam in boilers instead of directly.

With the recent heavy advances in the price of coal in Italy, one result of the war, it became necessary to enlarge the original plant and now one of a capacity of 15,000 horse power has been installed and is in operation. The electrical current generated by it is being sent by wire to the cities of Northern Tuscany and has proved a boon to many small industries. Further extensions are contemplated, as it is believed that hundreds of thousands of additional horse power can be harnessed.—Seattle P.-I.

DOG FISH ARE BEING PACKED EXTENSIVELY

Seattle, Jan. 15.—A packing plant at Friday Harbor, Wash., has just canned 300 cases of dog fish, and plans to complete fifteen thousand cases before the end of the season. The label on the cans says: "Grey fish a new food packed at the request of the United States Bureau of Fisheries and under methods approved by it. The grey fish is esteemed in European countries but hitherto has not been utilized in the United States."

There is a large demand for grey fish eggs for use in tanning leather. They are half as large as a hen's egg. Grey fish was served last night at the annual dinner of the Washington Newspaper Institute. University of Washington, and was pronounced excellent.
