

This is not a square deal. We love the British Empire enough to fight and die for it but we love Canada too, and would like to have a few Canadians left after this cruel war is over.

The fate of Colonel Bruce's report, together with the fact that his office of Inspector General has been abolished, shows how Sir George Perley, Overseas Minister of Militia, is prepared to handle any good Canadian who comes over there with the idea of telling the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. The whole truth? Great heavens, not even half truths are allowed. It isn't done, you know. If it were, there would be some startling revelations as to the number of supernumerary colonels and other officers now loaning around England or making occasional excursions to the front, where they have nothing to do. Rumor has it that these coionels were to be given the option of becoming lieutenants and going to fight, or going home to Canada and taking off the khaki. This was a false alarm. Those who want to stay in England will be allowed to stay as usual. Those who want to go home will be allowed to go home. but they will not be asked to resign either their pay or their khaki.
