Since the outbreak of the war, the Germans have built merchant ships totalling 750,000 tons in preparation for the trade war which will follow peace.

The Admiral Watson, which recently went ashore off Fidalgo, Alaska, is proceeding south under her own steam. She will be dry-docked at Seattle.

Philip Boileau, whose drawings figured often on the cover of the Saturday Evening Post and other publications, has died in New York.

It is reported that Ambassador Gerard has notified President Wilson that he will send in his resignation if Washington is not satisfied with his speech at a recent banquet in Berlin.

Charles Goldstein, prominent fur-buyer of Juneau, Alaska, has just returned from a trip to Atlin in search of fur. He reports that the outlook for fox this year is poor, the country being over-run by wolves and coyotes.

"The Index," published at Monroe, Washington, says that "bad weather at Berlin is again interfering with activities on the western front."

NEW ATTORNEY-GENERAL SAVES PROVINCE MONEY

Victoria, Jan. 20.—A. M. Johnson, the new deputy attorney-general of British Columbia, will act for the province in the suits being brought against the bonding companies which guaranteed the depositors and creditors of the Dominion Trust Co. This announcement, made in a notice filed in the supreme court registry yesterday, is in line with the policy announced by Hon. M. A. Macdonald, attorney-general, a short time ago that under the new regime the paid officials of the crown would appear personally in the law courts more than formerly. Mr. Johnson will act in the two suits against the bonding companies instead of W. J. Baird.

One of the suits is for payment of a \$200,000 bond furnished by the Railway Passengers' Assurance Co., and was started by the former attorney-general, Hon. W. J. Bowser, about two years ago. Although Mr. Baird was then retained by the government to act for it in the case and engage counsel, the case was never set down for trial. Hon. Ralph Smith, the present minister of finance, started the other suit recently, which is for payment of a \$50,000 bond put up by the London Guarantee Co. Mr. Baird was also retained for this suit, but Mr. Johnson will now take over both.

The British Columbia government is carrying on these suits as the representative of the depositors and other creditors of the Dominion Trust Co. in this province. The liquidator has other suits in the courts and pending and represents all the creditors everywhere. Thus, if the province is successful in recovering the \$250,000 or part of that sum, another suit may have to be fought as to whether the money will be used to pay the B. C. creditors or all of them. The liquidation is going on under a Dominion act.

It will be remembered that \$200,000 was placed in the provincial estimates by the former government, but Mr. Bowser, then attorney-general, found it impossible to pay out the money till the courts decided about the bond money. Hon. Ralph Smith, it is understood, will be interviewed by a deputation representing the depositors on his next visit to Vancouver, in regard to the prosecution of the suit, which it is understood will now be pushed vigorously to a conclusion.
