not in any belligerent sense, but rather as "Guardian of the Seas," seeing to it that the seas were free to all nations. Mr. McClymont received most hearty applause at the close of a very fine speech.

### "Our Boys."

Responding to the toast, "Our Boys," A. M. Manson, M. P. P. for Omineca, delivered a speech which went to the hearts of all who heard it. "As we look upon the blood-stained battle fields, one wonders why," said Mr. Manson. "One must shudder that the hand of man can be responsible for the havoc wrought by man upon his brother. Man's inhumanity to man," in the present struggle is beyond the understanding of any of us. Yet it has been thus from the earliest times. We wonder if some of the responsibility is not ours. As Scotchmen, we must believe that the whole thing is not a mere accident, nor the mere act of one man, but that behind it there is a purpose." Mr. Manson went on to speak of the call of Sir David Beatty that the British people get back to the old anchor- age. He said that Burns could have realized it, had he been alive today.

They sent out their husbands and their sons, and no man could realize the sacrifice they were making.

### "The Haggis."

The haggis was brought in with the usual ceremony, Aid. McClymont carrying it in above his head and marching round the table to the skirl of the bagpipes, played by Piper Sturgeon. It was received by David Thomson, who gave a splendid rendering of Robert Service's "Haggis of Private McPhie," from the Rhymes of a Red Cross Man. During the evening, songs were rendered by J. Sinclair, J. G. Steen, G. McColl, C. W. W. Gauld, R. Dowther, A. Clapperton, W. Martin and J. Sturgeon. Scotch readings were given by W. Robb and D. Thomson, and J. Cowie and J. Sinclair gave a "Jock Daw" duet. Scotch music was splendidly rendered by W. V. Davies and J. Lee. Much of the success of the evening was due to the house committee, W. Martin and A. Clapperton. The program arrangements were in the hands of W. Robb, T. McMeekin and G. McColl. "God Save the King" completed one of the finest "Burns' Nights" ever celebrated in Prince Rupert.

place upon these declarations. In blunt language, that interpretation is nothing more nor less than that the new government must remain in office in toto, the entire staff left to it by the old regime. The matter need only be stated in plain terms to illustrate its own absurdity.

"Under my responsibility as a minister of the crown, I intend to recommend and to carry out only such changes as may be deemed to be in the public interest, but, from the performance of my duty in this regard, however unpleasant it may be, I am not to be deterred, either by interested or well-meaning criticism.

"The task ahead of us is an exceedingly heavy one, and will require united effort, but we must meet it with unflinching courage in order that the conduct of government may be placed upon a proper basis and the great resources of this province brought into production at the earliest possible date."

## THE ROAD TO THE RIGHT.

YOU'VE met at least one of those few good old souls, who are constantly getting the worst of it when shopping, who don't believe in advertising. A hundred disappointing and instructive experiences have failed to teach him their plain lesson.

When he bought his first watch he was beguiled into buying one without a known name or a trustworthy guarantee. That watch—a poor timekeeper—cost him dearly by reason of missed appointments and missed trains, and for frequent repairs. Yet he paid the price of a good watch.

It is the same story with regard to his underwear, his shoes, and his fountain pen.

This good old soul's case is not unique. Many of us, if the truth be confessed, resemble him; we allow ourselves to be sold merchandise with an unknown brand or trade mark instead of buying merchandise which is well known to us through the medium of advertising. In slang language, we get "stung" pretty often.

In most of these cases we have ourselves to blame, for "the road to the right" thing to buy has been made plain by advertising.

There is no good reason for passing by the known thing, soundly guaranteed, to buy a dubious article, which, quality for quality, cannot be cheaper than the known, branded article.
