PEACE SITUATION

Sir Thomas White's statement that "Anglo-Saxon freedom and Prussian militarism cannot both survive" is about the best possible reply to President Wilson's speech. As the Minister of Finance in the Canadian government pointed out, this is a war of "irreconcilable ideals" and this vital point is just what President Wilson has sought to ignore, or at least has gently evaded. In his efforts to maintain a strict neutrality, the President has endeavored to place the Central Power and the Entente Allies upon the same plane. Building his peace efforts upon such a foundation, it is little to be wondered at that he has missed striking the right cord in the hearts and minds of the British people and in the minds and hearts of the Allies generally.

The Prussian military caste, which has controlled every spring of action in Germany since the days of Bismarck, stands for all that is evil and brutal in the world today and its aims are the direct antithesis of peace. A peace conference might be called at The Hague, or where you will, tomorrow; the most binding agreement might be entered into and signed, yet, so long as the Prussians rule Germany, just so long must that treaty be considered as of no avail as a leash for Prussian passion for conquest and brutality. President Wilson, with the other neutral nations, must realize that Peace and Prussianism are as far apart as the poles and can never have anything in common.

Drive the Hohenzollerns from the throne of Germany; banish the Prussian war lords from the control of German affairs, and there will be good reason to discuss peace. With the Hohenzollerns gone, and the people of Germany controlling their own destinies, instead of being dictated to by their military rulers, a peace conference would be in order; a lasting peace would be within reasonable distance, and President Wilson's peace

speech would probably earn for him the Nobel peace prize. Today, with the Kaiser still on his tottering throne, talking peace in order to make his seat, and the seat of his children, more secure, President Wilson is in the position of an innocent catspaw who is unconsciously working to preserve an absolute monarchy which has been the ruin of the German Empire. The irony of the present situation is that the President of the greatest republic in the world should be struggling to keep a Hohenzollern on his throne.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Hon. Charles Murphy is serving the people of Canada in demanding an investigation into the continued use of the Ross rifle after it had been condemned as being ineffective in actual warfare.

The Borden-Hughes correspondence is now proving a source of worry to the Premier, who will be hard put to it in refuting some of the statements made by the ex-Minister of Militia.

The only fault to be found with the report on the Canadian hospitals in England by Dr. Bruce, of Toronto, was that it was too truthful. The Baptist report which slurred over the rough spots is much preferred by the Government.

Sir John Jellicoe, in ordering a blockade of Heligoland Bight, is tackling a big job but the late commander of the North Sea fleet is the man for the job.

It was decided at the recent naval conference in London to build up a mercantile marine at the rate of ten for ten of ships sunk by the enemy. It might be a good scheme to also commandeer the interned German steamers. It would be interesting to read of German submarines sinking German ships.
