TRAFFIC DELAYED AND TELEGRAPHIC WIRES DOWN

Traffic over the Grand Trunk Pacific is still tied up owing to snow slides. The snow-plow got through the cut at mile 56 on Saturday but a still heavier snow-storm came on, heavy wet snow, driven by a high wind filling up the cut again. Following the thaw, a big slide took place, causing a further serious delay. Heavy slides have also occurred at Jasper, and the eastbound train is tied up at Prince George, while all telegraphic communication is cut off this forenoon, the wires having been brought down by the slide.

YOUNG MAN DROWNED WHEN ICE GIVES WAY

Donald McCrimmon, a young man of 19 years of age, engaged at Nanaimo, lost his life by drowning on January 19th, according to a report brought in to Bella-Coola by Constable Tucker of the Dominion police. Deceased was skating on the lake with George Mason, when the ice broke and McCrimmon went under. Mason shoved a board to the struggling man and made an effort to save him but only succeeded in getting into the water himself. Deceased was the only support of a widowed mother.

PRINCESS MAQUINNA HAD STORMY PASSAGE

The Princess Maquinna was unable to make the trip to Granby on Saturday owing to extremely heavy weather. She came back to Prince Rupert after making a call at Port Simpson. There was a little excitement at the wharf yesterday, when the C. P. R. vessel was torn from her moorings by the wind and drifted out a short distance into the harbor. She was soon moored again, however, and no harm resulted.

LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 134.)

C., as owner in fee under a Tax Sale Deed from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 10th day of September, 1915, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying, and being in the Municipality of Prince Rupert, more particularly known as Lot Ten (10), Block Five (5), Section Seven (7), Map 922.

You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within thirty-five days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by Registered Mail or as Directed, and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom: "...and in default of a caveat or certificate of his pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be for ever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."
