The Zurich correspondent of the Paris Journal states that the rumor has already been reported, according to which the German army is preparing to use new weapons, notably special poison gas shells, including hydrocyanide or prussic acid shells.

It is thought that these rumors are not altogether devoid of foundation, because the Swiss military authorities have asked the well-known chemist, Dr. Brummer, a captain in the Swiss Army, to make a report upon the effect of these shells and the means of protection to be adopted against them.—Exchange.
