## FROM FAR AND NEAR

Light deck guns firing projectiles of from 4 to 6 pounds, in the hands of trained gunners, have been found effective in dealing with submarines.

A British aviator performed one of the most thrilling feats of the war the other day, when he, while acting as observer on an aeroplane which had been damaged, climbed out on to one of its wings and stood there to balance the machine while it glided to earth. The pilot brought it safely to land.

W. E. Ditchburn, who has been inspector of Indian agencies in the southwestern part of the province for the past seven years, has been appointed chief inspector of agencies for the province.

Boys under seventeen years of age, who have been taken overseas as drummers and buglers, are to be discharged. Boys of over 17, who are well developed and who will reach the age of 18 shortly after arriving in England will be accepted for service.

South Vancouver Liberal Association recently passed a resolution protesting against Hon. Robert Rogers being sent to London as a Canadian representative to the Imperial Conference, in view of the finding of the commission of enquiry into the Winnipeg scandals. A copy of the resolution is being sent to Premier Borden.

Thornton K. Fell, clerk of the British Columbia Legislature since 1879, continues in that capacity under the new government. This is Mr. Fell's fortieth year as clerk. He has served under ten speakers, being all but the first.

The leading German Socialist organ, *Norwaerts*, asserts that the Socialists in Germany do not endorse the new unrestricted submarine campaign.

## LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 124.)

Re Application N. 9042—File No. 5794.

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Marion B. Morrissey, of Prince Rupert, B. C., as owner in fee under Tax Sale Deed from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 10th day of September, 1915, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying, and being in the Municipality of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot Eighteen (18), Block Eight (8), Section Eight (8), Map 923.

You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by personal service) and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:— "and in default of a caveat or certificate of his pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be for ever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

AND WHEREAS on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 9th day of September, 1914, (the date on which the said lands were sold for overdue taxes), you were the assessed owner thereof.

FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that at the same time I shall effect registration in pursuance of such application and issue a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the said lands in the name of Marion B. Morrissey unless you take and prosecute the proper proceedings to establish your claim, if any, to the said lands, or to prevent such proposed action on my part.
