## BLOCKADING THE NEUTRALS

If Germany has taken into account all the probable results of her course as fully as is indicated by the reports, she must have calculated upon a result which, though not apparent at first glance, is reasonably sure. That is that if the United States is forced into war, and if Germany's war zone is as effective as she expects it to be, she will have automatically blockaded the European neutrals.

Granting that she can succeed in cutting off the United States from England, she will also, if we enter the war, cut the United States off from Holland, Norway, Sweden,, Switzerland, Denmark and Spain. If we become her enemy she will attack our ships wherever she can find them and will impartially cut off our trade from every country in Europe. What will be the effect of that severance upon our commercial course?

The effect will be that we shall strain every nerve to deliver our goods to Great Britain, France, and Italy, which will be fighting our adversary. We shall do that merely as a matter of military policy, if for no other reason. The neutrals will be the chief sufferers by the effectiveness of Germany's deadline. At present Germany undoubtedly gets a good deal of what we export to them, notwithstanding the agreements by which they are restrained from delivering such goods to her. That having been the case, to about the degree that any blockade can be effective, it must also have been legal. The situation is quite different as regards the campaign against merchant ships which Germany has unmeans of submarines, craft of a type that neither can draw a real cordon around a coast nor blockading ships must treat merchantmen or be no better than pirates and murderers. For it has never been admitted -it has never before been claimed-that mere entrance of a blockaded area of the sea otherwise is to waste strength. gave the blockaders a right to destroy without warning, visit, and search. Then, as always, except for escaping or resisting vessels, the usual immunity from destruction remains, and to ignore it is the very culmination of illegality .- N. Y. Times. Free Press.

It is recognized that the raising and training of an army on the scale of the European armies would be the work of many months, during which the war might be brought! to an end. In the event of a declaration of war steps doubtless will be taken immediately to recruit a great army, but probably the States' greatest assistance would lie in another direction.
