## KAISER IS NOW PHYSICAL WRECK

"The German Emperor is considered to be a madman, even in Germany. He is hopelessly addicted to the use of drugs, because of chronic ailments in the throat and ear, which cause constant pain. The Emperor spends most of his time in the Royal Palace at Potsdam. He believes that Germany lost the war in the battle of Jutland and his most intimate advisers believe that the country must make peace by July."

So says Mr. Edgar M. Moore, who has just arrived in New York from Germany, Helmuth, the Kaiser's personal chauffeur, is his authority. "The Kaiser is very irritable when his ear causes him pain and he and his ear and throat physician, who is one of his aides, are constantly quarrelling over the enormous quantities of cocaine and morphine which the Imperial patient insists upon every day. 
