Strawberry Compote

TELEPHONE BEAT LIGHT

Phone Statement Shows Profit. Light is in the Hole

MR. LOVE'S REPORT

Prince Rupert's Wire Conducted Conversations Have Cleared \$794 for the City, but the Light Has Cost \$100 too Much

E. Love manager of the Telephone and Light departments of the city submitted his report to the council on Monday showing the cost of working and revenue derived from the 'Phone and Light departments for the past month.

There were 342 'phone subscribers at 30th April and 412 'phones in use. The revenue was \$1469.00 and the expenses \$674.31 leaving a surplus of \$794.69 to the good.

The Light department earned \$1137.50 and cost \$1036.56 which gives a deficit of \$99.18. Alderman Hilditch suggested that the profits from the 'phone department might be devoted to extending the system. Alderman Clayton preferred the idea of using the profit for the purpose of reducing the rates for the 'phones to users. This has been Alderman Clayton's view all along in regard to profitable municipal enterprise. It should act so as to reduce the cost of common advantages to the community.

Douglas's Maiden Speech

Alderman Douglas made this matter the occasion of his maiden speech. He said that if there were any profit from the 'phones the people should get the advantage, and the 'phone users among the people would benefit most, and most fairly, by the use of the 'phone profits to improve and extend the system. (Cheers from Alderman Clayton.)

On the motion of Alderman Douglas seconded by Alderman Smith, the reports were filed, and the question of how to use the 'phone profits is left with the finance committee meantime.

DISGRACE TO CIVILIZATION

Shocking Revelations of Vancouver's Jail are Given

PRESS DENIED ADMISSION

Police Chief Chamberlain Tells of Seeing Twenty Men Huddled Together in One Cell--Were Fighting to Pass Away the Time.

That conditions prevailing at the Vancouver jail are wretched was a fact forced home yesterday afternoon following the conclusion of the meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners. At the meeting Police Chief Chamberlain stated that as many as twenty men were herded together in a cell at times. He referred to one night this week when men taken into custody for being drunk attempted to pass away time by indulging in pugilism. A constable had to be detailed to keep order.

Dr. Underhill, medical officer of health, stated that the conditions were abominable and a disgrace to present day civilization.

Representatives of the press were denied admission to view the prison which has at times been condemned as totally unfit for human habitation.

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
