THE PEOPLE'S TRIUMPH.

The revolution in Russia is not the direct outcome of the war. Its causes go much further back than that. It is the climax of an unrest for hundreds of years. Self government, which Canada has enjoyed for many years, is what the people of Russia have striven for so long, and now at last they have been successful in throwing off the yoke of the autocrat. Some years ago, the Czar Nicholas, who at heart, has the welfare of his people, gave the country a constitution, and arranged for an elective assembly. But whenever his advisers, the bureaucrats, thought that the Duma was going to start something which would be for the good of the country at the expense of their practically unlimited powers, the Duma was ordered to be dissolved. Time after time the same trouble arose in the desire of the Czar's immediate entourage to preserve their old status. The Duma could resolve, but it had no executive power. The power would not be given to it, but the people collectively would not be denied. In its efforts to effect an improvement in the war administration as well as the alleviations of the conditions which had caused much suffering and distress once more the dissolution of the Duma was ordered. But this time, the Duma called upon the people and the army to rise in revolt. With the army and the people combined, the success of the popular movement was decided.

As in Germany, the Cabinet is named by the Emperor and not chosen from the representatives of the people. Over the Cabinet, the Duma had no control. Premier Golitzin, on being called to office a few months ago, refused to introduce any measure of internal reform on the plea that the prosecution of the war was the first and only duty before the government. His attitude, and that of the reactionary coterie who surrounded the Czar, coupled with the ever widening rift between the Cabinet and the Duma, hastened the denouement of last week. The attempted dissolution of the Duma was the last straw.

There appears to be no desire of the people of Russia to

change their form of government, but only the method. The Czarvitch is still to be the prospective ruler of all the Russians, with the ex-Czar's younger brother to be Regent until he becomes of age. The mainspring of the whole movement is to be found in the deep-rooted desire of a strong and earnest people to manage their own affairs without the incubus of an often foreign controlled bureaucracy forever hampering them in the expression of their national aspiration. The world has reached the stage now that free expression of the will of the people must be taken heed to. It is strange that governments and rulers are so slow to learn and to "discern the signs of the times." The example shown by the people of France, of the United States, and the numerous rebellions in Europe, between 1840 and 1850 were surely enough to show for any governing element the popular trend of thought. The world has advanced far since even these days, and the divine right of kings, in which the ex-Czar and the Emperor William of Germany still firmly believe in is now nothing but a relic of a by-gone age. That the "voice of the people is the voice of God" seems true.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Teuton is patient and long-suffering. His racial conceit makes him an easy accomplice in all schemes for national aggrandisement. He is well disciplined and disinclined to rebel, even against the anarchists who rule him. But even the Teuton will turn. The great-grandfathers of the men dying in the trenches of France and of the women starving in the streets of Berlin revolted in 1848. The Kaiser knows that. The German Empire was born in a successful war. It will die when the fortunes of war turn against it. The submarine sink-at-sight policy is the last desperate throw. If it is abandoned, or if it fails (as it assuredly will), utter defeat is a mere matter of time—and then what of the Kaiser?
