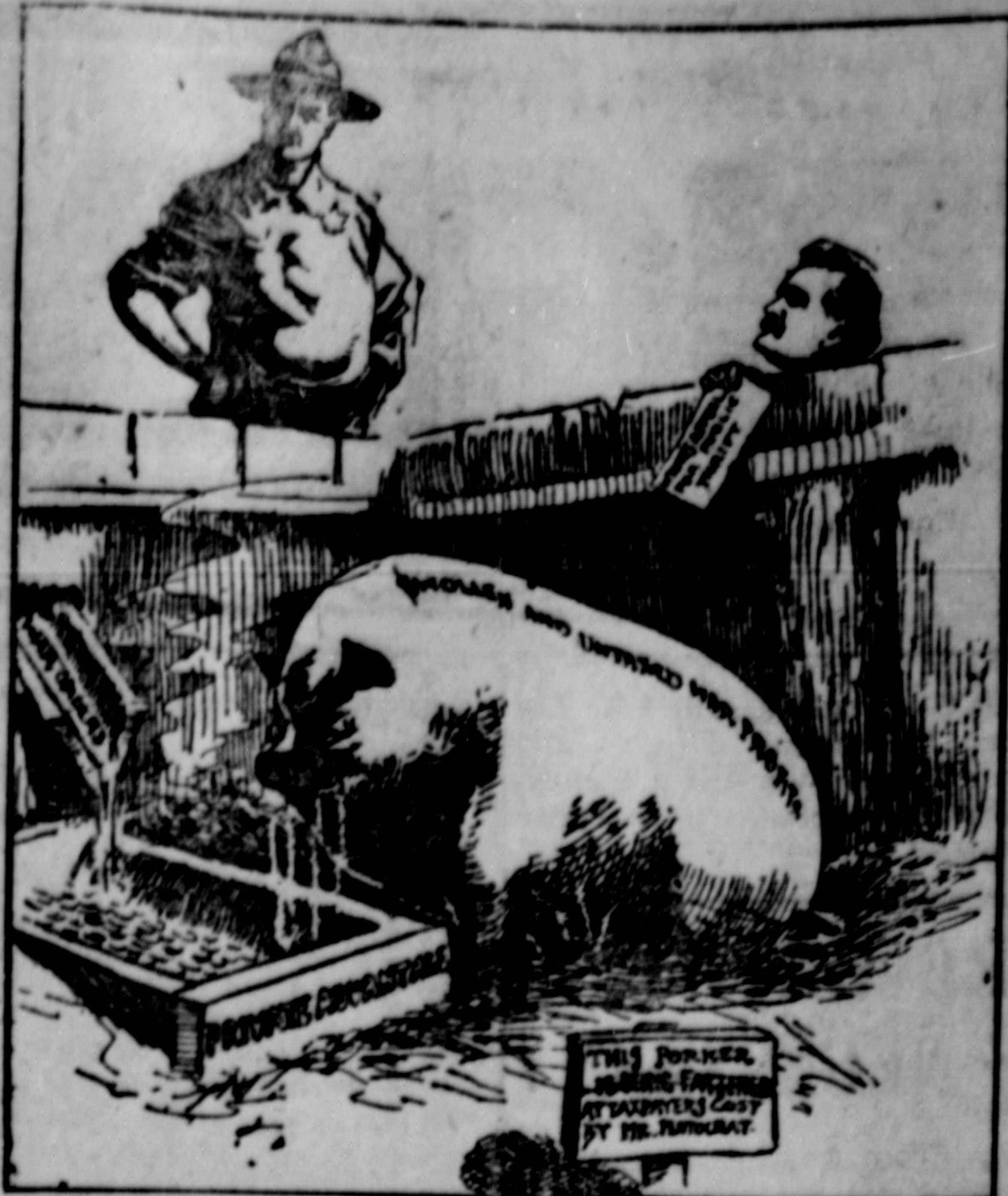

### In the Letter Box

Editor, Daily News,

Dear Sir:—I wish to protest against an article which appeared in The Daily News of March 23rd entitled "Negro ran amuck in the city last night." Also against an article in The Daily News of March 27th, entitled "The Public and the Police Court."

The article of March 23rd is without qualification reprehensible. In that article you set to work and detail supposed evidence in connection with a criminal case on which a trial was pending and then you wind up with a plea that an example be made of the accused party. This is clearly a resort to lynch law and furthermore is contempt of court. How any British subject who has an ordinary public school education and has been brought up in British surroundings could be guilty of such a lapse it is up to you to explain. If you deem yourself qualified to take over the administration of justice at Prince Rupert why do you not devote your energy towards convincing the Attorney-General of your latent talents and in the meanwhile it might be advisable to let the courts dispose of court matters according to the well-established principles laid down for the detecting, convicting and punishing of crime. Such a course would probably conceal from the public many things you do not know.

It may be that you are not so much to blame for the article of March 27th, as you are reporting proceedings of the city council as a news item, but the publishing of such a report I submit is improper while cases are still pending in court against the accused party. I further think it is not proper for aldermen to criticize a judgment of the court when they admit that they have no knowledge of the evidence on which the judgment was based. Such conduct is egotistical and unreasonable in the extreme, and it is very unjust to the magistrate who tried the case, unfair to the city prosecutor, and has a vicious effect in as much as it is calculated to exercise an improper influence over the court on matters now pending in the court.

I regret to have to write this article but we should remember that it is our duty to try these cases in accordance with the law and not in accordance with the prejudices and desires of citizens. Until the evidence establishes a man's guilt in a proper court of justice he is innocent and as citizens it is our duty to avoid lynch law and keep our hands and tongues off the accused and off the courts, until the courts have finished.

#### USE AND STORAGE

TAKE NOTICE that Magnus P. Olsen, whose address is Anyox, B.
