NOTES FROM PORT CLEMENTS

The tug "Cumshewa" arrived at Port Clements from Prince Rupert with mail last Thursday. Mr. A. R. Mallory, J. P., returned on her from the south where he has been spending the last month on business. Mr. Fowler, Mr. Smith and Mr. Phillips were also passengers in the tug.

Both the sawmills here are running, they have their own crews logging, and are stacking up big piles of lumber awaiting shipment.

The weather which has been very rainy and backward this spring is warming up again, thus causing a stir amongst the farmers, who have wintered in town. They are eagerly preparing for the cultivation of their fields.

A very great relief was felt about the shortage of food supplies on the arrival of the launch "Tempest King" from Prince Rupert Sunday afternoon, loaded down with provisions. Owing to the cancellation of the last trip of the steamboat, many of the staple lines of provisions were entirely gone and it was found necessary to send a small boat to Prince Rupert to keep the Grand Trunk Pacific steamship service from actually forcing upon our population the dreaded pangs of hunger. So E. J. and Bert Tingley undertook the job of transportation, considered somewhat hazardous for the smaller craft at this stormy season of the year.

After a delay of three days in Rupert undergoing engine repairs the "Tempest King" left Prince Rupert at two o'clock Saturday morning on the return trip to Port Clements. Although facing a steady northwest wind, she made good headway to Rose Spit. From there to the entrance of Massett Inlet the westerly wind increased to a gale and after getting within about four miles of Massett Inlet the "Tempest King" could not make further headway against the terrific storm and was carried backwards. From eight o'clock Saturday night, this staunch 30-foot craft battled with wind and wave, the seas ran mountain high and she was rapidly carried before the storm until at four o'clock Sunday morning the wind spent its fury and allowed the little grub-laden packet again to proceed. That no further damage to ship and cargo was done than the loss of a dinghy and a case of bacon and one sack of mush speaks the highest praise for the seamanship of the crew.

LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 134.)

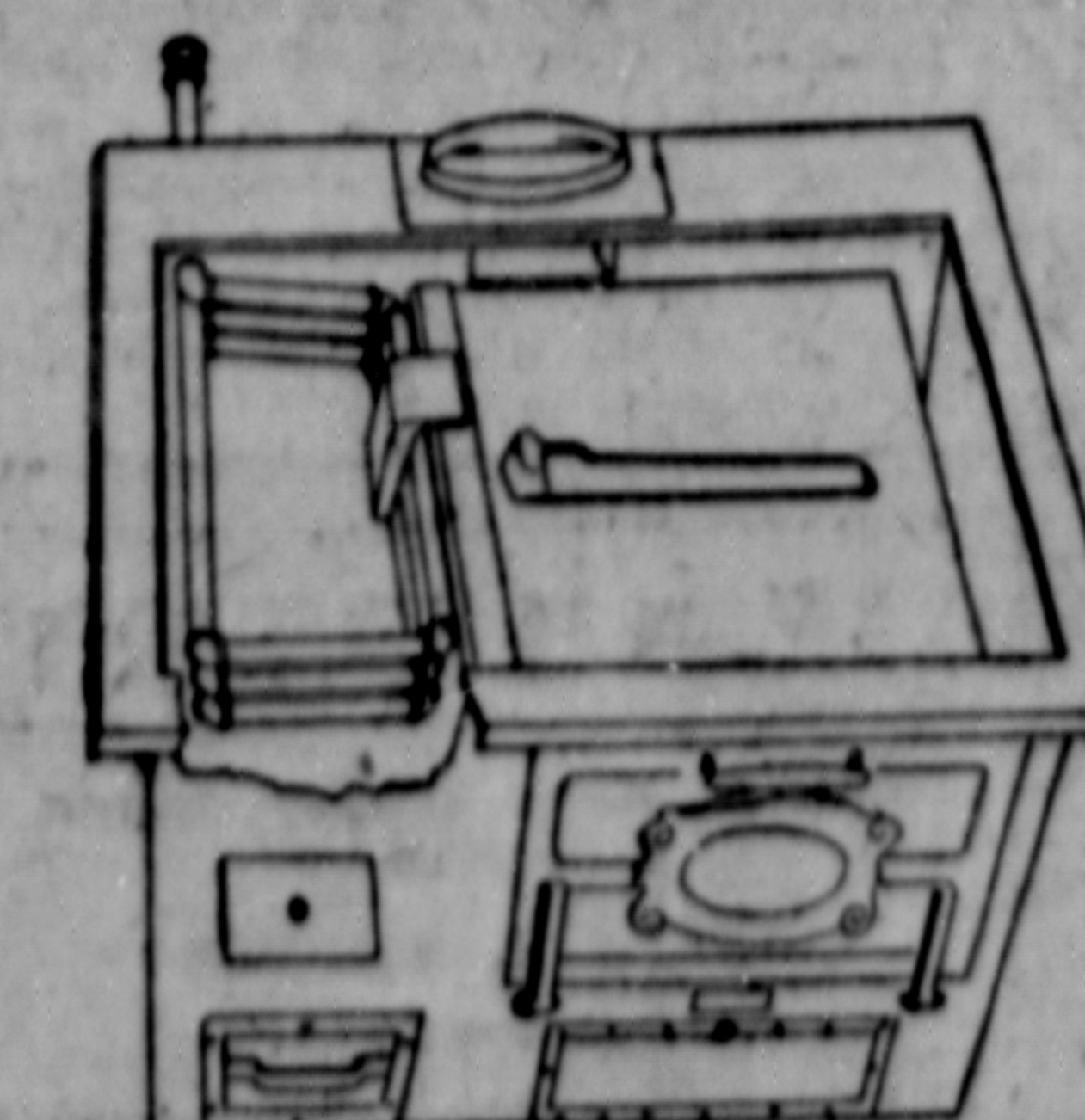
