tau, from where many men were sent to work in the salt mines. "This," he said, "is terrible work. I have seen our boys come back from the mines with their hands eaten away by the salt. Crippled men are forced to work at the point of the bayonet, which the Germans are not slow to use."

For the greater part of nine months' imprisonment, Gray was working in a railway carriage show at Duisburg, near Dusseldorf. There was a particularly brutal doctor, who invariably refused to allow men to go away sick. Conditions at Duisburg, Gray said, were very bad. Everybody was hungry. Frequently German officers would beg the British prisoners to sell them a small tin of food, for which they were ready to pay almost any sum. All the men complain bitterly of ill-treatment by their captors and agree in describing food inadequate and fit only for pigs, had it not been for continuous supply of parcels through the Canadian Red Cross they would have been half starved, in rags and bootless. Fourteen days in the cells on a bread and water diet was the punishment for attempts to escape.

How to go about it
BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.
CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.
If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.
