In the Letter Box

To the Editor:—Regarding the passing of the Woman's Suffrage Bill and its now being law, it is to be regretted that more prominence has not been given to this subject. As an effort to arouse the interest of our women to the importance of their new privilege with its accompanying responsibility, a meeting of the women, called by the ministers and a few of our best men would only have been in keeping with this reform. The privilege is so new, it may be that we are unable to appreciate its full significance, and value at the present. To those who, as yet, have given but little thought to what the vote to women will mean in regard to the highest welfare of the community I would say, put aside all else, and go register.
 The present conditions of our city, and other cities also, leaves much, very much to be desired as a place for the rearing of our children, and the upbringing of our young people.
 It would appear that it is only by the women, with their truer and higher sense of the real things of life; that these conditions will be improved, and an atmosphere and environment created, conducive to the happy and healthy growth of our children, and their development to real manhood and womanhood.
 I would remind all our women of twenty-one years and upwards of this new power vested in them, and that they should appreciate it by registering their names as voters at once. Thereby, when the opportunity comes they shall make themselves a felt power in the community.
