

THE HISTORY OF THE "SALVOR"

When the "Salvor" was in port the other day with the disabled "Prince Rupert," the fact that she was an old friend of Harbor Master McCroskie came to light. For several years he was her captain and at that time she was called the S. S. Danube.

"During the time of the Klondike rush, I used to run her to Skagway," said Captain McCroskie, "and I believe that she is one of the most wonderful old ships now afloat."

Built by Napier and Co., of Govan, now part of Glasgow, in 1869, the "Salvor" is now forty-eight years old, and yet she is a staunch vessel. She is of iron construction and her dimensions when first registered as the S. S. Danube were, length 215 feet, beam, 27 feet, 7 in., draught, 20 feet 7 in., gross tonnage, 887, registered tonnage, 561.

As the Danube she was the first vessel to pass through the Suez Canal, and she received one of the first pairs of fore and aft compound engines ever built, which are in her still. She was engaged in the Mediterranean and Eastern trade, and was considered one of the finest vessels then sailing. It was in her that the body of David Livingstone was brought home from Africa.

Then she was the first steamship chartered by the C. P. R. Co. to inaugurate their service between Vancouver and Hong Kong, preceding the Abyssinia and the Batavia. After that she was purchased by Captain John Irving for the Canadian Pacific Navigation Co., of Victoria, and under the command of Captain John Myers, took the commissioners of the sealing award to the Behring Sea.

On returning from this trip, she was engaged in the coastwise trade, running from Victoria to San Francisco, under the command of Captain McCroskie, and later to the Naas. At the outbreak of the Klondike rush, she was transferred to the Victoria-Skagway run.

When purchased by her present owners, the British Columbia Salvage Company, Ltd., her name was changed to the "Salvor" and her hull reconstructed. "She is a fine model of a steamship, built on beautiful lines, and can ride out heavy seas like a duck," says Captain McCroskie, "and barring accidents, she will be a staunch seagoing steamer for many years to come."





