GOOD WORK DONE BY ITALIAN NAVY

Rome, May 2.—Official figures now available show that the transportation of the Serbian army to safety was a great task, and that it was accomplished almost entirely by Italian warships and merchant vessels.

These conveyed 11,651 wounded and ill through the submarine-infested Adriatic, besides 130,841 soldiers taken to Corfu and 4,100 to Biserta. To do this 303 trips were made, while 17 trips were required to transport cavalry and 15 to take prisoners and food supplies.

Nineteen times the convoys were attacked, but each time the enemy was frustrated through the alertness of the Italian destroyers.

THEY ALL VOLUNTEERED

We should like to print this story in letters of gold. It is of a Colonel on the British front who wanted twenty men to face almost certain death. He called the whole company together and made the situation clear to them. Then he asked for twenty volunteers to advance one pace. He loved his men, and it was almost more than he could bear. He closed his eyes to keep back his tears, and when he opened them the men stood in exactly the same formation. He was pained. "Is there not one volunteer?" he asked. A sergeant stepped forward at salute. "Everyone has advanced one pace, sir," he said.—Tit-Bits.

AUSTRIANS CANNOT STAND A GOOD MEAL

For the last few days, according to a New York Times correspondent in Berne, Switzerland, writing about the middle of February, a number of people have been allowed to cross the Austrian frontier into Switzerland. Directly they reach a railway refreshment room or entered a Swiss dining car all of them naturally ordered a meal, but in almost all cases an ordinary substantial meal proved too much for them, and, instead of benefiting them, simply made them ill. The dining car attendants are, therefore, obliged to make provisions for these Austrian passengers just as stewards and stewardesses must do for passengers crossing the Channel in a rough sea; while the Swiss, who would ordinarily travel by these express dining car trains from the Austrian, or even the German frontier, now usually leave them in sole occupation of Germans or Austrians, at any rate, should there be any considerable number of either on board. A German or Austrian, in short, generally requires a week or more after arriving in Switzerland to become accustomed to ordinary food.

NEW ZEALAND SHEEP

London, May 1.—Speaking at Newcastle, Mr. Massey, Prime Minister of New Zealand, stated that there are in the refrigerator storehouses in New Zealand, 2,000,000 carcasses of sheep awaiting shipment, but that no vessels are obtainable to carry them to Europe. By the end of this month the number of carcasses would be 3,500,000. Mr. Massey also stated that New Zealand could export this year \$40,000,000 worth of dairy produce.
