BRITISH PEOPLE EAT TOO MUCH BREAD

London, May 4.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons, Captain Charles Bathurst stated the estimate showed that the consumption of bread last week was six pounds per head instead of four pounds, as recommended by the food controller.

The frequent claims of Germany that her submarine warfare is succeeding beyond hopes will doubtless be regarded in that country as fully justified as a result of the publication of last week's losses to shipping in Wednesday's newspapers. The official returns of last week's sinkings and the menace to Great Britain's food supply implied in it are referred to yesterday by the morning newspapers, which unanimously emphasize, with exceptional prominence of type and space, the seriousness of the U-boat campaign and the imperative necessity for food saving.

Special articles and editorials discuss the outlook with emphatic and in some cases sensational gravity. Some of the writers attack the Admiralty for not coping more successfully with the U-boats and others give it advice, while all of them insist that the people are eating far too much, and say that if they do not curb their appetites disaster is inevitable.

The newspapers print statements to the effect that hardly one person in ten has heeded the warning given by Lord Devonport, the Food Controller, when he put the public on his honor to observe the nation limit. Some of the journals assert that a rationing scheme is not merely probable, but has been decided on, and that bread tickets are already in the printer's hands.

ATTACK BY CANADIANS SIMPLY IRRESISTIBLE

London, May 4.—Referring to the Canadian success in the capture of Arleux on Saturday, the Daily News correspondent at the front says:

"I have heard from Canadian officers details of the capture of Arleux which confirm that it was quite a fine performance. The line before the village was heavily wired and the wire was only cut in places. Running north from Arleux are three successive sunken roads, each of which was fortified by the Germans for defense and held in strength. The ground before the village is undulating. The attack had to be delivered longitudinally along two ridges and hollows, so that the troops on the right and left could not see each other.

"The village or Arleux itself was full of machine guns, while from a long dip which runs back toward Fresnoy the enemy could sweep the village with machine gun and rifle fire, and also bring up reinforcements.

"All the conditions, therefore, were very favorable for defense, but the Canadian attack was irresistible."
