CANADIAN RECRUITING

Canada is pledged to raise 500,000 men for overseas service and that pledge must be kept. The half-million, as promised, did not include munition workers or British, French, Italian and Russian reservists now fighting in the armies of their respective countries. Nor was it presumed to include the thousands of ineligibles who never should have been passed by the doctor. It certainly could not have included home defence organizations. The undertaking, given by Sir Robert Borden, was interpreted as meaning that this Dominion would be represented on the battlefront and in those services immediately subsidiary to the trenches by 500,000 men.

At the present rate of recruiting the country's pledge will not be fulfilled. Our losses in April were at least three times the number of enlistments. We have, or are about to have, five divisions at the front, but if the conflict throughout the summer continues to be as fierce as it is now it will be gravely difficult! to maintain an establishment sufficient to keep the fighting arm at its full strength unless the recruiting situation in in France.


