THE INCREASE IN THE PRICE OF DRUGS

Compared with the rise in the cost of foodstuffs the war-time increase in the prices of drugs has been enormous, and there are no signs that the upward movement in values has come to a stop. In fact, almost every day drugs are becoming dearer. For our supply of medicinal substances we always have been and always shall be dependent to a very large extent on oversea sources. Many of the most important vegetable drugs cannot be grown—at any rate economically—on our soil and in our climate, and although we may look forward to a future when practically every item of materia medica will be produced within the Empire, the fact remains that whenever oversea communications are dislocated our supplies will be curtailed. Such commonly used drugs as sarsaparilla, storax, myrrh, guaiacum, coca leaves, juniper berries, liquorice root, valerian, and many others are extremely scarce, and in some cases there is a possibility that except for small quantities in chemists' shops here and there, certain drugs will before long be unobtainable. Fortunately we can do very well without many of them, for if one remedy for rheumatism, say, becomes extinct, there will always be an adequate

The few drugs that will probably become cheaper in war time include aspirin, salicylate of soda, and phenacetin, which are now being produced on a considerable commercial scale in this country. Lanoline is another product that is now being produced here, and the price of which is declining in consequence. The effect of the great advances in the prices of honey, lard, and olive oil is also felt very seriously by the manufacturing druggists, for these common commodities of commerce are used in many medicinal compounds, which are dearer in consequence. Thus honey is used in cough medicines, lard in ointments, and olive oil in plasters.—Glasgow Herald.
