THE NATION IN ARMS

Conscription is a word of smister import to Anglo-Saxon womouracies. war and peace, us a great rienen writer says, still move outside the law of democracy. The evolution of democracy not yet being compiete in the English-speaking countries, there is an inherent uistrust of militarism as a force invariably hostile to democraic freedom. It was this active distrust of militarism that made conscription impossible in England in the early days of the war. It was this distrust that hampered the French nation in its task of army reform before war broke out, and in overwhelming numbers drove the smaller Allied armies across the Marne. It was this distrust that, in Canada, made it inexpedient heretofore to adopt it until the voluntary system had been given a fair trial In this country, unfortunately, voluntary recruiting was never organized as Lord Derby organized it in Great Britain. Voluntary recruiting in Canada is as dead as Julius Caesar. It is too late to amend the past. The ravages of war have rendered obsolete principles of national service that passed muster a year ago. There is but one course now to pursue if the honor of Canada is to be preserved. Until the war is ended Canada must be a nation in arms. Those who will not volunteer must be made to serve. The fighting divisions of Canada must be reinforced by Canadians.

Militarism as a weapon which democracy can wield in its own defence is not to be confounded with the military systems that are employed to buttress the citadels of feudal tyranny and autocratic rule. Military service, when democratized and nationalized, entrenches democracy in the citadel of government. Its fundamental characteristic is that of an army of defence. It defends the liberties of the nation and aids in the maintenance of international peace. For the Allied nations this is a war of defence-the defence of national independence against the imporal ambitions of Germany, and the defence of international peace. It is a conflict between
