KINCOLITH WON MARCH SKIDEGATE THE OVERTURE

Brass Band Contest Among the Indian Tribes Was a Great Success—Musicians Acquitted Themselves With Very Credit.

Winner of March Contest, Kincolith Band, Conductor, William Macdonald, selection played, "Battleship Alabama March."

Winner of Overture Contest, Skidegate Band, conductor Mr. Solomon, selection played, "Bridal Rose Overture," by Lavelle.

Prizes—Silver cups and medals for the bands. Gold medals for the conductors.

In the Empress Theatre during the afternoon seven Indian Bands took part in the contest got up by Mr. J. S. Gray at very short notice. Some of the bands travelled far to enter and all did very well indeed. It was a treat to see the enthusiasm with which the conductors took their places baton in hand to lead their bands. As each band concluded its turn the bandmen took their places in the hall in specially reserved seats to hear the performance of their rivals, and it was interesting to study the expression of the players in the role of critics.

Ambitious Critics
The programme of music played by the Indian Bands reveals at once the ambitious character of the musicians, and the amount of satisfaction they gave to the judges and the audience is in itself as much reward as the prizes they won. By drawing lots the order of performance was settled on, and was as follows:

The Kitkatla Band led off with the Overture from William Tell, and a characteristic march. Then followed the Greenville Band which played "Sounds from England," including many favorite airs, and also a popular march. The Ayash Band played the "Triumphal March" by Prior, and the overture from Gounod's Faust. The Kincolith Band played the "Battleship Alabama March," and as Overture Stradella, by Wagner. Port Simpson Band which though summoned in haste, and rather unprepared, has a great reputation, played the Steel King March by St. Clair, and "A Night in Berlin," by Hartmann. JMetlakatla's Band gave the "Jolly Robbers" by Suppe, and the Trocadero Overture, and the Skidegate Band played the "Fair of the Fair" March and "Bridal Rose Overture" by Lavelle.

Hint for Rupert
As Judges Messrs. J. S. Gray, William Godson, W. L. Barker, and J. Casley had a difficult role, but after due consideration of the varied merits of a marvellously meritorious group of bands, they decided as mentioned.

Putting it as tenderly as possible, Prince Rupert really should take a lesson from the Indians of the surrounding districts, and establish a city band. There was something of an unintentional rebuke to the city in the fact that from seven different neighboring places far less developed than Prince Rupert there should have visited us seven uniformed and wonderfully trained bands equipped with costly instruments, and ready to render with quite remarkable effect some of the works of the world's greatest composers, while we ourselves have no organized band at all.

WHALES SEEN NEAR NADEN

They are of the "Right" Kind Too.

WILL START HUNTING

This Specie is Valuable for Its Sperm—Good Prospect for the New Harbor Whaling Station.

That the new whaling station recently opened at Naden Harbor will in all probability yield the largest returns during the season which has just commenced, is the belief of many shipping men. Reports have been received here that the species of whales known as the "Right" the most valuable, has been discovered there in large numbers, although the whalers have not harpooned many yet. Since the station was opened at Naden Harbor, the whaling steamers have sighted a great many of these whales, but they have not been able to get within range of the big fellows.

According to information received, it is thought the breeding grounds of the "Right" whales are in the vicinity of Naden Harbor. Very few of this species of whale have been caught since the whaling industry commenced. They are reckoned to be more valuable than the sperm and the amounts paid the members of the crews of the whalers for securing one of these is very large.

Whaling at the other three stations of the Canadian Northern Pacific Fisheries Company is becoming brisker every day. Rough weather off the coast is now a rare thing and the little steamers are in their glory. The catches so far have not been large, but the reports which come from the stations are now beginning to show an increase each time.

SUPREME COURT HERE IN JUNE

Sittings Will Open on 15th—Strange Anomaly Occurs

In response to a letter to the Deputy Attorney General, from Mr. Alex M. Manson, secretary of the Bar Association here, a telegram was received by the Registrar of the Supreme Court, to the effect that a Supreme Court judge will hear civil cases in Prince Rupert on June 15th and following days.

This creates the strange anomaly that a large number of men will have to go to Victoria for the criminal assize there on June 5th, while a Supreme Court judge will be visiting here only ten days later.

Amongst their chums they had their champions, and loud and shrill were the cries of encouragement as the race was run in heats.

A Coming Champion

Winners of the first heat in the Boys' race were Frank Hilland and George Ambrose. The race was a tremendously hot one, and the contestants burst the tape with energy fit to finish a record quarter mile. The winners of the second heat were Frank Dowling and Jack Christiansen, and the four lined up for the final with all the determination of amateurs in a championship. Experienced athletes around the tape-line at the finish of the race were delighted with the time made by the winner, 11 2-5 seconds for the hundred yards.
