THE WARFARE OF THE SAVAGE

(By C. G. Lucas.)

During a year's service in France, I have learnt that the Germans employ any weapon, fair or foul, that comes to hand; that they wage war against living and dead alike, respecting neither woman, child, or wounded man and seek only to destroy. This is the warfare of twentieth century savages, made more terrible by the employment of every scientific aid. It is war against decency and humanity.

I have seen the use of poison in the water supply of a town placed there against the usages of war and regardless of the damage to an innocent civilian population. I have seen German batteries registering on and ultimately burning to the ground with incendiary shells an isolated farm house used as a dressing station, full of our wounded and flying the Red Cross flag so that all could see for what purpose it was used. The cross was painted all across its roof.

I have been billeted at farms in France and Belgium, where the occupants had been the unwilling hosts of the Huns on their first advance and retreat, and from them I have heard the stories of ill-usage and bestial lust to which their women and children were subjected during the brief period of the German stay. In the same farms our troops have been billeted for months, and no complaint has reached my ears of any discourtesy, or any neglect to pay for even the smallest thing which was supplied. Many times I have seen our men giving a helping hand in the work of the house and the farm, playing with the children and entering into all the life of the occupants.

tween the opposing armies is in their treatment of the dead. In the trenches I once saw a rough Yorkshire miner place some flowers on a grave which was at the back of the parapets, and going up I read the English inscription on the plain white wooden cross "Here lies the body of an unknown German soldier." How the German regards the dead was shown by the discovery in "No Man's Land" near Hill 60 of a dead Canadian: no wooden cross and no flowers had been placed over him, but to his leg was fixed a wire connected to a powerful German bomb. It was so laid that any movement of the body would have blown to pieces both the dead and those who might come to give him a decent burial.

These are things that I have myself seen and I remember them when I hear people speak of peace by negotiation. I know what such a peace would mean. It means the sacrifice of all for which civilization has striven for centuries; it means the triumph of the beast over the human. Judge men by their works, not by their words. Think of a world governed by those who introduced the use of gas and poison vitrol and microbe into warfare, who respect neither living nor dead, wounded or woman. Think of a peace overlooking such outrages, a world wherein the poisoner, the thief and the ravisher are to live side by side with their victims in amity and brotherly love. I feel that only complete lack of understanding of the realities of this war can inspire the people who think of peace short of complete, unquestioned victory, and the utter destruction of Prussian militarism, or those who babble about being careful to avoid humiliating Germany. As well talk of offending the susceptibilities of a mad dog, or being careful to avoid humiliating a red-handed criminal of the Jack the Ripper type.
