## WHY ORGANIZED LABOR OPPOSES CONSCRIPTION

resources." And even while organized labor was putting that gun to Premier Borden's head, Sir Thomas White was refusing in the House of Commons to tell what profits were made by the milling companies who are now charging sixteen dollars and a half a barrel for flour. Organized labor also points out that the first thought of the Borden Government was how to send fifty thousand more men to the slaughter-pen in Europe, not how to make it easier for the wives and children of the soldiers now at the front, who are at the mercy of the food pirates. Three times since the war started the pension and separation allowance have been increased to keep pace with the cost of living, but the blood-suckers are still dollars ahead. A few vampires are soaking up all the money in the country.

How does the Borden Government deal with the food pirates? Well, some months ago it issued an order-in-council which permitted a municipality to start an investigation if some cold storage king by paying a few dollars on an injunction didn't head it off. Even if the danger of an injunction was escaped the investigation was still bound to be a farce because, as everybody knows, there are several rooms in a cold storage warehouse. In the outer room is the visible supply, which is never allowed to be more than the needs of a week. When the investigators look at this they invariably find that the quantity stored is not excessive, but if they went out of room No. 1 through the doors now closed into the other rooms, where the reserves are kept, they would tell a different story. Bluebeard's crimes wouldn't be in it. As the law stands the investigators are not permitted to go beyond this outer room. Organized labor says that the law ought to be changed so that the whole warehouse may be thrown open to inspection and the full horrors of the food situation revealed. Moreover, when pursuit grows hot, the cold storage fellows should not be allowed to deport their stuff into freight cars and dodge the investigators.

Only the other day McCoig of W. Kent read a telegram to the effect that Mr. J. W. Flavelle was seeking insurance on two million eight hundred thousand dollars' worth of cold storage products in Toronto. As he could only insure for eighty per cent of their value, it follows that Mr. Flavelle has food locked up in the one city of Toronto amounting to three million five hundred thousand dollars. The Davis Company, of which Mr. Flavelle is the presiding genius, has cold storage

warehouses in other cities and towns, and Mr. Flavelle is said to be taking a little flyer on his own account in the United States, which keeps five meat packing plants busy. Mr. McCoig asked if J. W. Flavelle, the insurance seeker, was the J. W. Flavelle, chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, whom the Borden Government delights to honor, and Sir Thomas White replied, with blushes—no doubt, the glow of pride—that he was.

Since selective conscription was broached the Government has thrown out hints that it intends to appoint a food dictator who will limit the amount of food to be stored in warehouses and order the release and distribution of stored food when it may be deemed necessary. Outside of this "unrestricted marketing"—whatever that means—is to be allowed to exercise its beneficial effects—if it has any. Unrestricted marketing probably means that the public will have perfect liberty to buy what is left over after the cold storage operators have taken all they want. It is (continued on Page Four.)

## "WATER ACT, 1914."

BEFORE THE BOARD OF INVESTIGATION

In the Matter of all Streams in the Hazelton and Fort Fraser Water Districts.  
A MEETING of the Board of Investigation will be held at the Court-house at Hazelton on Monday, the 23rd day of July, 1917, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

In the Matter of all Streams in the Prince Rupert Water District.  
A meeting of the Board of Investigation will be held at the Court-house at Prince Rupert on Wednesday, the 25th day of July, 1917, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

At these meetings all statements of claim to water privileges under Acts passed before the 12th day of March, 1909, on any of these streams, all objections thereto, and the plans prepared for the use of the said Board, will then be open for inspection.

All persons interested are entitled to examine these, and to file objections thereto in writing if they deem fit.

Objections will be heard forthwith if the party objected to has received sufficient notice of the objection.

The Board at the said meetings will hear the claimants, will determine the quantity of water which may be used under each record and the further works which are necessary for such use, and will set dates for the filing of plans of such works and for the commencement and completion of such works.

And whereas there may be persons who, before the 12th day of March, 1909, were holders of water records on the said streams and yet have not filed statements of their claims with the Board of Investigation, such persons are required to file, on or before the 15th day of July, 1917, a statement, as required by section 294 of the "Water Act, 1914." The forms (No. 50 for irrigation and No. 51 for other purposes) may be obtained from any Government Agent in the Province.

The claims of riparian proprietors who have filed, as required by section 6 of the "Water Act, 1914," statements of claim to waters of any of the said streams will be heard at the same times and places.

DIVERSION AND USE

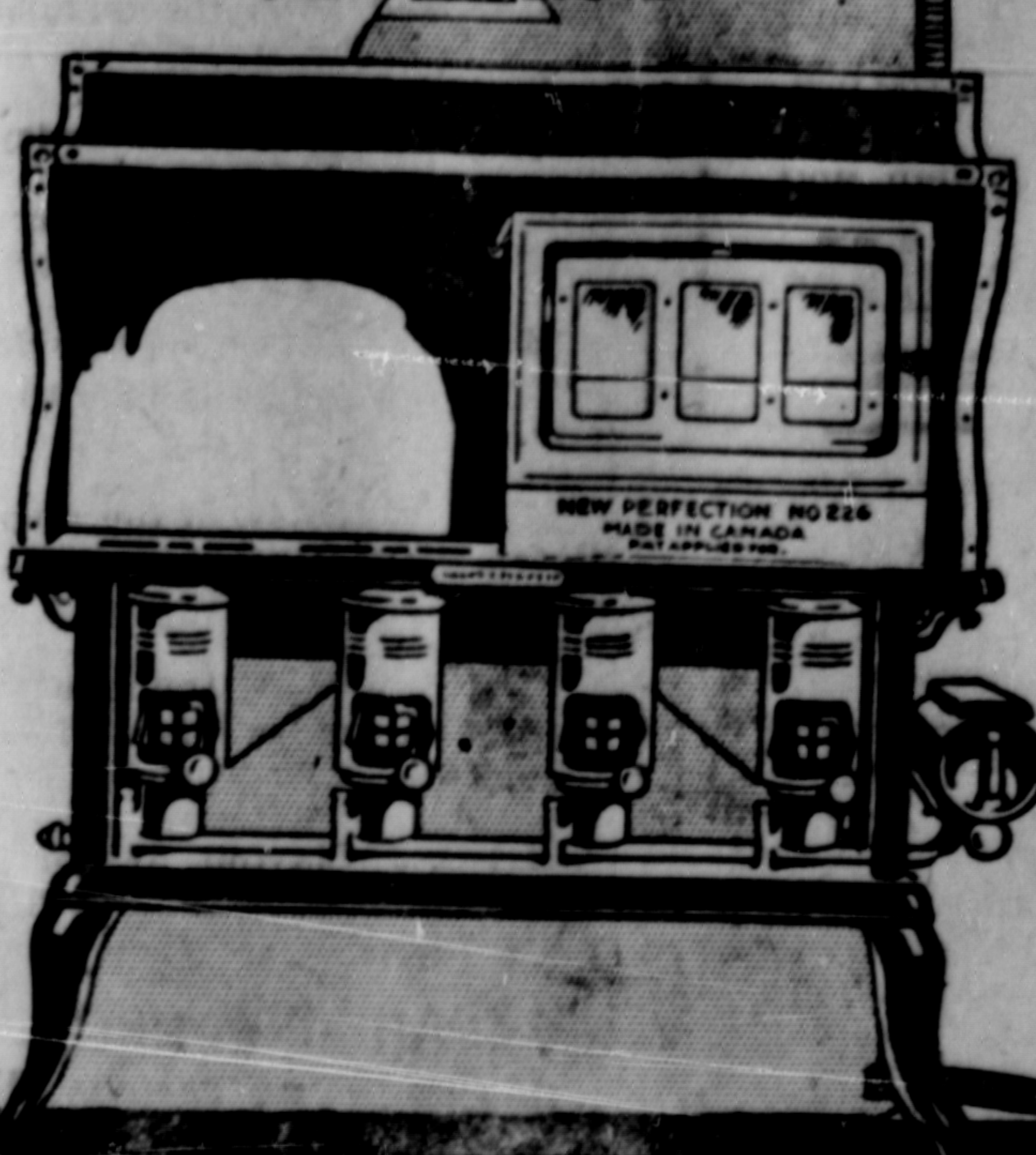
