The Trades and Labor Council will meet tonight.

Mr. W. Laing, of Victoria, arrived in Prince Rupert yesterday.

Mr. J. F. Strang, of Sunnyside Cannery, was in the city yesterday.

Mrs. and Miss Forsyth have arrived in Prince Rupert on their way to Langara.

Mr. Victor Henningson, of Portland, Ore., is paying a visit here for a few days.

Mr. A. J. Watkinson, of the Provincial Police Department, was in the city yesterday.

Mr. Arthur T. Bailey, of Inverness Cannery, was paying a visit to Prince Rupert yesterday.

Special meeting of the Fish Packers Union will be held on Wednesday at 8 p.m. All members please attend. 160.

The Seal Cove Red Cross tea will be held on Wednesday afternoon, June 27, at the home of Mrs. Blance on Sixth Ave.

The name of Private T. M. Jones, of Prince Rupert, appears off the latest casualty list. He was in the Mounted Rifles and was wounded.

Mr. and Mrs. V. O. Strickler, of New York, have arrived in the city. Mr. Strickler will lecture on Christian Science in the Westholme Theatre tonight.

Mr. F. L. Buckley, of Vancouver, has returned to the city after a trip to Prince George. He intends opening up the sawmill at Kyax in the near future.

A cheque for \$22.75 will be sent to the Patriotic Society, being the net proceeds of the lecture given by Dr. McNeill last week to the St. Andrew's Society on the war.

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, it was decided to accede to the request of the Dominion Day sports committee for the grant of \$100, the same as has been done in previous years.

The question of the selling of the lots at the corner of Second Avenue and McBride St., which reverted to the city recently, was reported upon to the city council last evening. It was recommended that the said lots be not sold. The report was adopted.

At the High Court yesterday before Mr. Justice Morrison, an action for damages for injuries received by Mrs. Case by a blasting accident on Fulton Street was heard. The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff and assessed the damages at \$3,000.

Mr. E. M. Jacobs, who left here with Lieut. Col. Guthrie, and Captain Percy Godenrath to join the McLean Kilties (the 236th) has been in Halifax undergoing a qualifying examination. He has one more examination to pass and expects to get overseas very soon.

Reports from the public utilities committee were adopted at the meeting of the city council last evening for the purchase of meters to be used for power consumers, who at present are on a flat rate, and also for the placing of the distribution of the city's water supply under the city engineer.

When the tax notice papers are received this year, a slip will be attached showing that this year's taxation is 67 per cent less than 1913. The municipal taxation has been reduced 60 per cent since the war began. This slip will request for prompt payment of the taxes, as this is a necessity for efficient and economical financing.

A return billiard match will be played at the St. Andrew's Society's rooms on Friday night at 9 p.m. by Mr. J. B. F. Melville against three of the Society's star players. Mr. Melville is one of the best amateur cueists in the province, and as he is leaving shortly, this will be the last opportunity of witnessing his play in a display match, for some time.

In connection with the summer tourist service, the G. T. P. have decided upon an innovation this season in the shape of an orchestra. Henceforth, both the steam-

ers Prince Rupert and Prince George will carry an orchestra of three pieces, and this will be a regular feature aboard these vessels. This is a departure that will be greatly appreciated by the tourists patronizing the G. T. P. steamers.

everywhere with the R. A. M. C. They can, and have, all the means to perform operations during the voyage if they are necessary. Nothing has been spared to provide them with complete apparatus. The strictest discipline is at all times observed; nurses and orderlies must adhere to the routine of their tour of duty as much here as anywhere else.

As we near England, so that the land appears as a low grey cloud, men limp up the companion with sticks and crutches and crowd to the space behind the fore-hatch. We pass a sister ship outward bound, and then our ship steers into calm water inside the mole. Here are yet more of her green and white sisters getting ready to return to France, swabbing down, scouring, holy-stoning. At the quayside a long hospital train is drawn up to receive the cargo of pain. The gangways are thrown across. The "sitting cases" must wait till the long line of stretchers has been stowed in the train. The bearers work with the greatest rapidity and gentleness. The disembarkation is effected twice as quickly as with a crowd of jostling tourists. The ship swings off to moorings, and her crew make ready once more to carry on their work. It is monotonous work but they brave the dangers of the sea that are haunted by a foe knowing neither honor nor pity.
