WAR PROFITS

In the discussion in Parliament on the business profits war tax amendment bill recently, the opinion which is general among the great majority of the people of Canada was voiced by the Hon. Mr. Gloran in the Senate. Like the Military Service Bill, the business profits tax bill is only of half measures. The Hon. Mr. Gloran spoke as follows: "This bill strikes me as one that will create alarm in the country. It has, in fact, already done so. This bill, sanctioned by the Finance Minister, tells the people of Canada that a certain class of persons called manufacturers are making anywhere from seven to one hundred per cent profit. If that does not alarm the working classes, I would like to know what would." And the Government allows companies or individuals to make profits of from seven to one hundred per cent or more. Is that not alarming? Is it not a cause for the people to cry out for the conscription of wealth as well as the conscription of blood?

Is the fact that profits are made of from seven to one hundred per cent and over not a cause of the high cost of living? The leader of the Government has said that the high profits are not made by munition manufacturers alone, but also by others; by boot and shoe manufacturers, by beef trusts, by coal storage concerns, and is the Government going to allow this to continue? I contend, with the vast majority of the people of Canada, that during this war time, any profit over seven per cent should go into the public treasury, to put down the high cost of living and give the government a chance to pay the interest on the national debt, which is increasing by millions and billions.

I understand that the present Finance Minister, a friend of the trusts and the manufacturers, does not want conscription of wealth; and so far as the public knows, he, as a member of the cabinet, is opposed to any such scheme, and prepared to resign if any such scheme is carried through. We have it from the lips of the Government itself that a small

class of people are taking from the pockets of the masses 100 per cent profit. Is that not an outrage upon the economy which is urged upon the people? I say that no profit should be allowed over 7 per cent, which is twice as much as the Government gives to the poor man who deposits in the savings bank his hard earned money.

These profiteers, be they munition makers, be they pork dealers, or beef dealers, or cold storage men, or gain dealers, or millers, the Government should be courageous enough, as has been done in France, as Lloyd George is doing in England, to prevent from making these excess profits.

The Government has not taken one step," continued Mr. Gloran. "To prevent the monopolistic classes, or the manufacturing classes, from bleeding the rest of the people, what is the Government for, but to guard the welfare of the people? The Government is promoting the interests and wealth of the companies and the individuals who are bleeding the masses in this country and sucking their life blood. How can the Government go before the people and say 'We want your confidence; we have conscripted your manhood, 430,000 men have left the shores of this country for the battlefields of Europe, now we want more of your blood.' And the people will say to them, 'Yes, we are ready to shed our blood on the battlefields of Europe, but the dependents, the mothers, the children, the cripples, the sick, and the old, are left behind to be bled, not on the battlefields of Europe, but in their own homes, by your protégés—the protégés of Sir Robert Borden and his Government—by your protégés, the manufacturers the munition makers and others.'

"What can Sir Robert Borden expect but that? This bill relays to the country that manufacturers, companies and individuals, are making excess profits. The word 'excess' is so easy to say. The word should be 'outrageous'."

The great majority of the people of Canada will agree with the Hon. Mr. Gloran.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

An order in council has been passed by the Government appointing a commissioner to operate the coal mines in Alberta. It has taken the Government a long time to make up its mind to have anything serious to do with this basic industry of the Dominion. The Hon. Thos. Crothers, Hon. R. Rogers, and R. F. Green, M. P. have all tried their hands in settling the strike, but without result. In the end, the only way out is that which has been done elsewhere. The British Government took over the mines there, greatly to the benefit of the Empire, but the idea of government ownership of anything is unpopular at Ottawa. Rather than operate the splendid Transcona shops for making munitions, as Baron Rhonda recommended they should be, they were leased to a mushroom profiteering company. The Government tells the people to save, and to economise, but when it gets a chance to save munitions profits for the nation, it doesn't do so. Another case of "don't do as I do, but do as I tell you."

The German workmen in the Prussian State railway shops are finding it impossible to put in an eleven-hour day on the rations they are receiving. They are
