HAIG STRIKES ANOTHER BIG SUDDEN BLOW

Enemy's Positions Captured Near Oppy-All Objectives Gained -Lens Practically In Ruins.

Special to The Daily News).

London, June 30 .- To the south and the southwest of Oppy General Haig struck another sudden and tremendous blow at the German lines. The enemy's forward positions were captured over a front of two thousand yards, and all the objectives sought were gained. Our troops continue to gain ground on a wide front south of the Souchez river, and have entered Avion, which is the greatest gain made by the British since the capture of Vimy Ridge. Raids have been made on the German trenches near Croisiles, and Armentieres, and many prisoners have been taken. .

Lens is practically in ruins from both the German scheme of destruction, and from the shells of the fighting forces. Hindenburg is thought to be staging another strategic retreat after the fall of Lens.
