MAY WEAR THEIR HATS.

Women Jurors in California Have a Special Concession Granted Them.

Women jurors may wear their hats while sitting in the jury box, according to a ruling made by Judge Cassidy in the Superior Court of California last week.

The matter came up during the trial of A. A. King of Watts, who was acquitted by a jury composed entirely of women, on a charge of printing a story in his newspaper in violation of the law. During the examination of the venire of women, one of the prospective jurors asked whether it was permissible to wear her hat in the jury box. The judge answered that it was entirely optional with the jurors. Several women continued to wear their hats, while the others removed them. "I've been converted," said Editor King after the verdict was read. "I fought suffrage, but now I'm a booster."
