The residents in this locality feel most strongly on the subject as a serious menace to health—not to mention the nuisance it will cause during the summer months, when the tides are small, and the creek low. When we think of the unpleasant odor caused in the summer by a few dying salmon, we may have a little idea of what to expect from the sewer in question, if carried out according to present plans. We have had a healthy city so far, and it is to be hoped this record will not be imperilled by the carrying out of a plan which, though now it appears to affect only a few scattered residents, may in the end be a set-back to the whole community. Why! such a state of affairs would not be tolerated in an Indian village. If Hays Creek had been situated in the centre of the city, would the plan as it now stands have been sanctioned as conducive to the health of the city? We very much doubt it. Then why should it be considered sanitary here?

It is not certain when the G. T. P. Ry.'s drydock will be completed—it may be some years, and surely in the meantime something can be arranged whereby a temporary extension be made to carry the sewage to deep water. Yours truly,

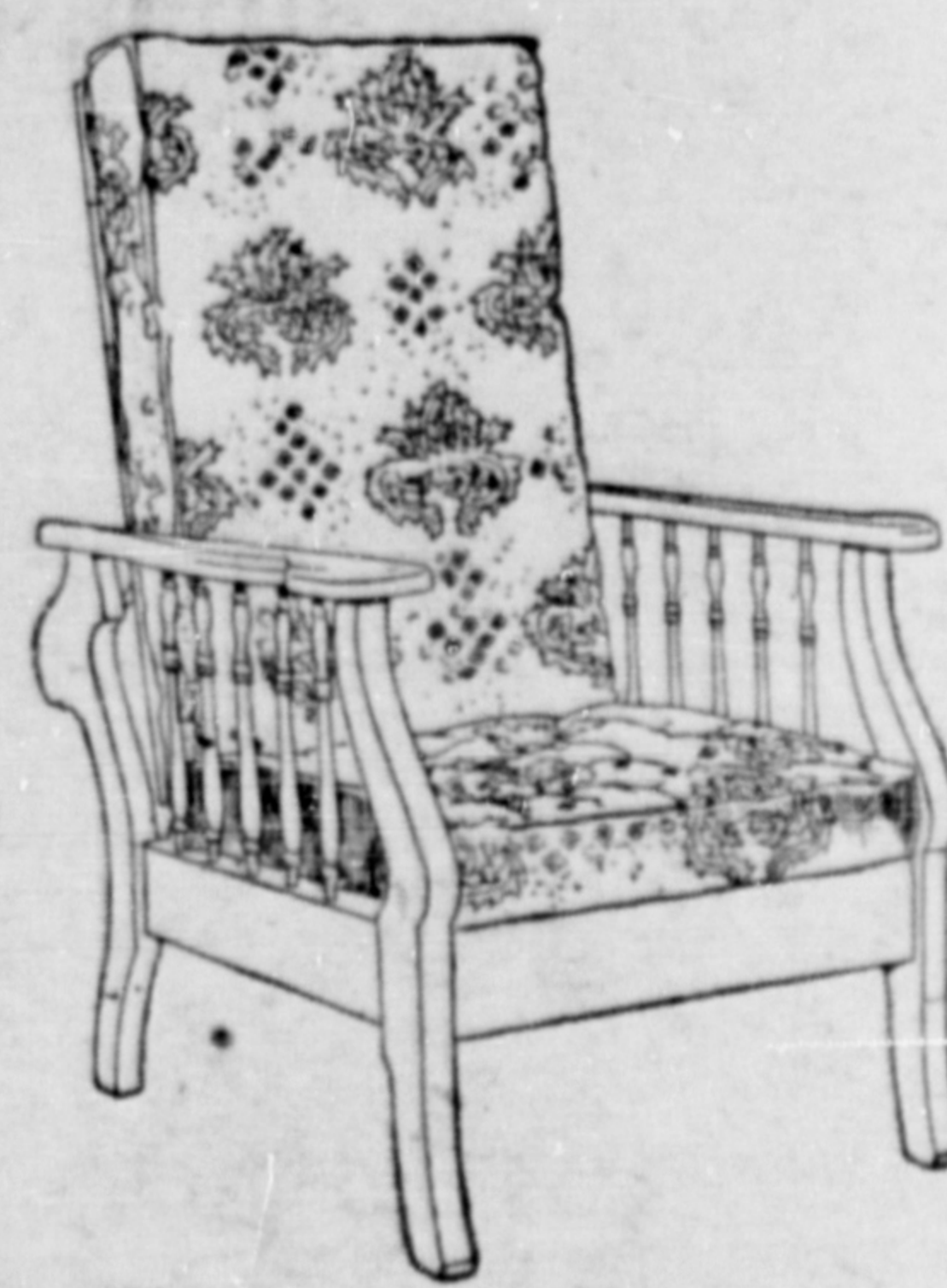
