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## GERMANY DECLARED WAR ON ROUMANIA

### BULGARIANS REPULSED BY THE SERBIANS -- A MILLION ROUMANIANS MOBILIZED

#### GERMANY HAS DECLARED WAR ON ROUMANIA

Roumania Satisfied that She will Realize Her Ideals—Our new Allies are Moving on the Galician Border.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Aug. 29.—Germany has declared war on Roumania.

##### Roumania's Reasons.

Paris, Aug. 29.—Roumania's reasons for joining the Entente Allies in the war is that there is a large Roumanian population in Austrian territory exposed to the hazards of war in the invasion of Austria.

Roumania also believes that her intervention will bring to an earlier termination the fighting which has lasted over two years, and that by uniting with the Entente Powers she believes that she will be able most efficaciously to realize her national ideals. Roumania will be able to furnish an army of a million men for the field.

##### Roumanians Moving.

London, Aug. 29.—The Roumanians are seeking to gain an entry to the Transylvania plains through the passes of the Eastern Carpathians, towards Kronstadt, and also in the direction of Hermannstadt, and are endeavoring to advance along the Bukowinian and Galician borders with a view to attacking the rear of the Austro-German armies. The enemy is trying to prevent the Russians from occupying the plains of Hungary.

##### New Airships.

New British dirigibles, which have just been launched, completely outdistance Zeppelins. Germany is greatly alarmed.

#### DOUBLE PERSONALITY OF HON. FRANK COCHRANE

Ottawa, August 25.—Students of history have been thinking that the vexed question of dual representation was settled long ago. They are all wrong. The Hon. Frank Cochrane is the living proof that the question is a red hot one right now.

The Hon. Frank Cochrane is about the neatest and completest thing in the way of dual representation that has happened since the issue was supposed to be put out of politics. He is a dual representative with a difference. In the old days a dual representative sat for two constituencies, one in the Legislature and the other in the Parliament at Ottawa—he was what you might call a two seat hog. But the law changed all that so the dual representative had to change his methods. Instead of sitting for two constituencies in two different Parliaments, he sat for one constituency in both.

That is how the Hon. Frank Cochrane operates today. His constituency is the International Nickel Company and he sits for it at Ottawa—and incidentally stands for all it does—as minister of railways, and in Queen's Park as Premier Hearst, with the Hon. Howard Ferguson as Johnny-on-the-spot, when Premier Hearst fades away to Europe. Of course, being only one man, and having a wooden leg at that, Mr. Cochrane can't cover all the ground at once, so while he attends to the job personally at Ottawa, he acts through Premier Hearst at Toronto. Premier Hearst is his Astral Body, so to speak, also his Absent Treatment for the nickel question.

The Hon. Frank's is the strangest case of dual representation that has ever been recorded since Robert Louis Stevenson conceived his famous character of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. What's more Mr. Hyde has the long end of the combination. In fact Mr. Hyde has been so strong lately, that poor, tortured Premier Hearst is in hiding, so to speak, in Europe at this very moment. #### DOLLY VARDEN WORK PROGRESSING WELL

R. B. McGinnis, of the Dolly Varden Mines at Alice Arm, left for the north on the Chelohsin yesterday. He expects to go south shortly to purchase equipment preparatory to more extensive development of the property. The trail is nearing completion and a start will soon be made in taking in drills and other plant.

Three crude oil engines of fifty horse power will be taken in in sections. There are about sixty men at work at the mines and a lot of ore is being blocked out ready for the mill.

#### LIEUT. JAS. RUSSELL DIED OF WOUNDS

Mr. Russell had been nearly two years at the front and was a most enthusiastic soldier, having risen from the ranks to a lieutenantancy. #### TEDDY'S CONGRATULATIONS

#### DAY LETTERGRAMS

The Grand Trunk Pacific Telegraph Company will (effective today) accept and forward between all points on its system, daylettergrams of fifty words or less, which will be treated as deferred service subordinate to priority transmission and delivery of full rate telegrams, at rate of one and one half times the regular day rate for ten words, and one-fifth of such rate for each additional ten words or less. Day telegrams must be written in plain English or French; code is not permitted.

#### SERBIANS HAVE REPULSED THE BULGAR ATTACK

Bulgarians Occupy Greek Territory—Serbians make Progress—The Greek People are With the Allies.

Paris, Aug. 29.—The Serbians have repulsed the Bulgarian attacks and have made considerable progress near Vetrenik.

The Bulgarians now occupy various localities abandoned by the Greeks to the west of Kavala. The Bulgarian invasion of Greek territory is powerfully and rapidly changing public opinion in Greece in favor of the Entente Allies. The Greek people are bitterly opposed to the Bulgarians being allowed to occupy Kavala and it seems certain that Constantine and his ministers will be forced to respect public opinion. British monitors have bombarded the enemy forces at the mouth of the River Struma which lies between Kavala and Saloniki.

#### Von Jagow Blamed.

Berlin papers commenting upon the Italian declaration of war and on Roumania's decision against Austria, charge Count Von Jagow and Dr. Zimmerman with being responsible for Germany's diplomatic defeat.

#### Bulgaria Wants Peace.

Petrograd, August 29.—It is reported that Bulgaria is suing for a separate peace.

#### Important Move.

London, August 29.—A Reuter despatch from Stockholm states that an agreement between Russia and Sweden for the construction of a bridge across the Tornea River, connecting Russia and Sweden, has been ratified.
